Senator Don Cameron was in New York a few days ago but he did not go near the Republican headquarters there, a something which has excited much comment. The Philadelphia Times is responsible for this:

Senator Cameron makes no concealment of his hearty contempt for the Republican standard bearer. Recently he had Senators Allison and Hale to accompany him to his home for a visit of a few days. In the parlor car of the railroad train was a well-known Indiana lawyer and Democrat, whose ability and whose prominence in the State are attested by the fact that he has twice represented a Republican district in Congress. When the four were seated the senior Pennsylvania Senator said, and not in a whisper, "Well, do you people intend to let that creature Harrison carry Indiana?"

No self-respecting man who was associated with Harrison in the United States Senate would go near him in the event of his election. I certainly would never call upon him. Allison and Hale here may not think it wise to talk as frankly as I do, but they know that what I say is true."

Betting on Cleveland.
The bookmaker in New York has not yet opened business for the Presidential season but he will soon step to the front. It is said to be a hard matter now to find any one who will put up even money on Harrison's election. A wealthy iron manufacturer at Pittsburg telegraphed a few days since to New York that he had \$100,000 that he would like to venture on Cleveland and that he might give odds of 10 to 8. He said that he could find no takers among the rich iron barons of that section. In this city we have heard of no bets of consequence as yet. It was reported, directly after the Maine election, that a Republican here, enthused with Mr. Blaine's midnight telegram as to the Maine elections, had offered to bet \$500 even that Harrison would be elected and we hear that within the past few days a proposition was made to take up the bet but that the party who made the offer has backed down.

We opine that it will be a hard matter for the Cleveland men to get even bets from this time out. Indeed, we doubt if many have been made anywhere. We do not want any one to take our opinion as a guide but we feel so confident of Cleveland's triumphant election that we will venture the assertion that in thirty days from this date it will be a difficult matter to place bets of two to one on Cleveland.

The Price of Cotton.
EDITOR REVIEW:—I delayed replying to "Long Creek's" communication in your issue of September 18th, thinking some of our cotton men would reply to it. "Long Creek" has fallen into the same error that a great many others have: that the farmer is paid for the weight of the cotton and ties at the price the cotton sells at. This looks so on the face of it, but the price here is regulated by the price in Liverpool, which is for the net weight of the cotton, the buyers here making allowance for that when buying cotton. I could give you all the items explaining how this price is arrived at but it is hardly necessary.

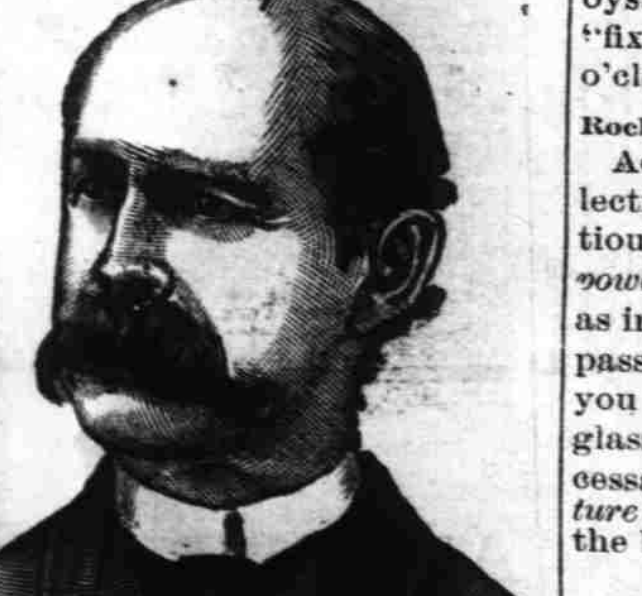
