TARIFF TALKS.

Mr. Bullock, one of the largest of our woolen manufacturers and a Republican, declares that without free wool the woolen industries can't be prosperous in this country and our American market can't be supplied by American mills and labor.

Mr. Singlerly, a Democrat, who has nearly half a million invested in woolen mills, declares that he can't operate his mills and employ labor at fair wages without free wool and chemicals.

Mr. Rhoades, of Seane, Delaware county, a Republican woolen manufacturer, says his woolen mills are idle because they are taxed to idleness by tariff taxes on raw materials.

Mr. Dobson, one of the leading carpet manufacturers of the country and a Republican, stated the exact truth when he declared to a congressional committee that with free raw materials and 25 per cent. tariff on his products he could manufacture profitably. The present average tariff tax on carpets is 58.81 per cent., ranging from 24.76 on hemp to 61.13 on tapestry Brussels and 73.92 on druggets.

Mr. Drexel, the most successful and conservative of our American bankers, and especially interested in the business and industrial prosperity of the country, speaks for intelligent and honest Republicans like himself when he declares that free raw materials are a necessity to successful industries in the United States.

Does Mr. Singlerly seek to destroy his half-million woolen mill to serve a party purpose? Do Messrs. Drexel, Bullock, Dobson and Rhoades testify against the mistaken policy of their party from any other motives than a sincere desire to prosper industry and protect labor?

A large majority of the wool consumed in this country is imported from foreign countries either in raw materials or in manufactured goods, and even under the high tariff tax of 41 per cent. to protect wool, the wool industry is steadily declining in the older States.

The battle for free raw materials used by our general productive industries is the great battle for the disenthralment of the workingmen of the country. It is a battle for enlarging our products; for enlarging the demand for labor; for enlarging wages by increased demand for workingmen; for reduction in the cost of the necessities of life and for cheapening our American goods to home consumers and competing in foreign markets.—Philadelphia Times.

hits "My son Oliver" a nail between the ribs. It is a fair and honest exposure of the law because by staying in it he is a deserter, whereas he is a deserter now for the legal profession.

That Capt. Alexander, a farmer, had been nominated instead of Judge Fowle, a lawyer, he would not have voted against him but would have worked for his election, whereas he has voted for a negro lawyer against a worthy white farmer and says he would do it again, and whereas he is going to vote for three lawyers running on the ticket with himself for allies not judicial against three Democrats, not lawyers, running for the same offices.

That he would have voted for Capt. Alexander because he is an Alliance man, whereas, as Captain Bunn so forcibly puts it, his platform and Capt. Alexander's are as far apart as the poles.

That our people in North Carolina pay comparatively little of the tariff tax, whereas about every article that our people use, in their homes, in their fields, in their shops, in the way of clothing and in every other way is increased in cost materially—an average of 47 per cent, and more—for the exclusive benefit of the Northern manufacturer.

That the News and Observer has said something somewhat in accordance with his own position touching the immediately before mentioned matter, whereas the whole preaching of this paper has been to the contrary from the beginning of its existence until now.

That it is the rich only who pay the tariff tax, whereas the fact is that the tariff discriminates distinctly in favor of the rich and against the poor, in favor of the silk hat of the wealthy man and against the wool hat of the farmer, in favor of the silks and diamonds of the wealthy woman and against the woolen shawls of the poor.

That he is a farmer, whereas his neighbors formally testify that as a farmer he is "a dead failure," worse than the most shiftless negro cropper.

That he is an Alliance man, whereas in subscribing to the tenets of the Republican party he violates every vital principle of the Alliance organization.

That he has the good of the State at heart, whereas he voted against every proposition to repudiate the infamous special tax bonds that would fasten upon our people a debt of thirty million dollars and more, and whereas he would fasten upon this white man's land negro domination.

But why go on? Dockery's "absolute verities" are too numerous to mention. They have all been exposed on the stump by Judge Fowle, Capt. Strudwick and other able Democratic speakers and will lead to the Radical candidate's utter repudiation by the people on the 6th of November.
