There comes from Glasgow, by way of Pittsburg, the interesting information that Mr. Andrew Carnegie has promised to the new European Steel Rail Ring the co-operation of the Steel Rail Ring in this country, of which he is a prominent and influential member. Mr. Carnegie and his associates will be glad, of course, to see prices advanced abroad by a foreign Ring, for higher foreign prices will give the Ring in this country a larger margin for the enhancement of prices here. For example, the Ring here raised the price to \$40 last year under the shelter of a tariff duty of \$17. If the price of rails in England should be made \$5 or \$10 higher than it was last year it would be possible for the Ring in this country to make its price even higher than \$40 without suffering from importations, provided that there should be an international agreement forbidding the sale of English rails in the United States below the Ring price abroad, not including the duty.

Mr. Charles M. Beach, one of the largest manufacturers of Hartford, Conn., says that Mr. Blaine and his party are away behind the age, and that they are unable to catch up with the procession. Mr. Beach, in a long interview with the New York Herald, shows in a very striking way that the best interests of Connecticut, and of the whole country, demand a revision of the tariff. He says that every interest of the people will be benefited by the passage of the Mills bill. As a manufacturer, he wants the bill to become a law so that he can sell his wares all over the world. In this connection he says: "The tendency of the Mills bill would be to correct this, as it would lighten the taxes on our industries, increase the home market for farm products and enable us to export more manufactured goods. We should pay a larger portion of our exchanges with the products of brain work, skilled labor and machinery. Connected exports Waterbury watches, lamp fixtures, silver-plated ware, clocks, carriages to some extent, and many large and small tools, the products of inventive genius. The cost of all these is much enhanced by the high duties on materials, and they do not bring one cent more in consequence of the tariff. If the import taxes on these materials were removed, or greatly reduced, this export business could be greatly increased, and we should also get an increased home market for farm products."

It is impossible yet to tell the exact profits of Hutchinson's Chicago corner of the wheat market. Shrewd dealers say that he has made millions, and that the end is not yet in sight. He is undoubtedly working to do the same thing over again with October and December. A Chicago correspondent says: "Mr. Hutchinson's methods in his deals were shown during the morning by his operations in October wheat. He threw overboard an immense quantity of it and then had all his brokers following and watching the market like cats, ready to buy it all back again as soon as it broke. Some idea of the profits he is making may be gathered from the fact that he received from the clearing house this morning checks to the amount of \$675,000. He has been receiving from \$20,000 to \$100,000 every day for two weeks. If September wheat goes to \$2 to morrow he will probably clean up between three and four million dollars. The chief losers have been Sid Kent, Linn & Fairbank, Poole & Sherman are short an immense line of September, but it is said to be for other persons, and the firm is not likely to lose much. The fact that there has been no failure in the board is taken as an indication that the bears are outsiders. Wheat is being shipped in from St. Louis and the West on express trains to meet the extraordinary demand."
