IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Mr. Allison, from the Committee on Finance, reported back the House Tariff bill with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. It was placed on the calendar and ordered to be printed.
Mr. Sherman got permission to make some remarks on the tariff bill, as he intends to leave the city this afternoon.
At the conclusion of Mr. Sherman's speech the Senate resumed the consideration of Mr. Hale's resolution of Monday last, calling on the Secretary of War for explanation of General Benet's circular as to discharges of Republican employes in United States arsenals and armories.
Mr. Cockrell proceeded to discuss the resolution, and opened his remarks by reading the Jay Hubbell circular, issued on the occasion of the Presidential campaign of 1882, calling on government employes to contribute to the Republican campaign fund, such circular having been signed by Messrs. Allison, Aldrich, Hale and Hiscock, the latter then in the House. He also quoted Garfield's letter to Dorsey, "of somewhat Star Route notoriety," asking him to have Mr. Brady, second assistant Postmaster General, called upon for aid; and one from Mr. Levi P. Morton to Mr. Dorsey, stating that he had contributed \$30,000. Mr. Morton's name, he said, was familiar as the present Republican candidate for the Vice Presidency. He simply read these letters, he said, to refresh the memory of the Senator from Maine, (Hale), and to show the depth of degradation to which the civil service of the government had been brought under the Republican administration in 1880 and 1882. It could never sink into lower depths than it sank then. It had become so utterly degraded that the Republican party was forced to take up and pass the Pendleton Civil Service bill. The position now occupied by Mr. Hale under pretence of defending that law, was (Cockrell asserted) "the stab of a pretended friend." Cleveland's administration had enforced the civil service law, and in his (Cockrell's) judgment its spirit had been too strictly adhered to.
Mr. Cockrell, at the close of his speech asserted that President Cleveland had redeemed and sacredly kept every pledge that he had made in relation to the civil service. As to the Benet circular, he understood that that officer was in political sympathy with the Senator from Maine, but he had no objection to the adoption of the resolution, and had no doubt that the Secretary of War would readily furnish satisfactory explanation. He saw no wrong in turning Republican soldiers out of office and putting Democratic soldiers in their places.
Without action on the resolution, or any other discussion during the afternoon, the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
On motion Mr. Herbert, of Alabama, the Senate bill was passed granting the right of way to the Pensacola and Memphis Railroad through the public lands of Florida, Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee, and through the naval and military reservations near Pensacola.
Mr. T. J. Campbell, of New York, presented and the House agreed to the conference report on the bill for the relief of the survivors of the wreck of the United States steamer Tallapoosa.
Mr. Barnes, of Missouri, presented the conference report on the Deficiency Appropriation bill.
The proposition to extend the United States laws over the public lands strip gave rise to considerable discussion.
Pending action on the report the House adjourned.

STATE NEWS.
Raleigh News and Observer: The pine straw bagging has been tried in the Raleigh compass and has been found to stand the test perfectly. It will probably come into extensive use ere long.
Goldsboro Argus: There is great complaint of the scarcity of cotton pickers from all sections of the county this year. —The grand reunion of ex-Confederate veterans, under the auspices of "Thos. Ruffin Camp," will come off at the grounds of the E. C. F. & S. Association, of this city, next Wednesday. It will be a momentous occasion and every old soldier should be there. A real old time barbecue will be indulged in on this occasion.
Asheville Citizen: We have it from good authority that a male child has been born to Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Miller, who reside near Hayesville, having two tongues. Both of these tongues are separate and distinct and are perfectly developed. The child is large and healthy and finely developed, save the deformity mentioned above. — From every section of Buncombe, Haywood and Madison, the fine tobacco belt of Western Carolina, we learn that the heavy frosts of the past several nights have done very serious damage to not only the tobacco crop, but to other vegetation. A friend writes us from Outlook, Madison county, Sunday's date, that the frost of that morning "did great damage, to at least one-third of the tobacco crop being out, and all that was out being damaged." "It did not hurt Democracy," says our friend, "for it is solid in Madison."

Charlotte Chronicle: Dr. A. A. Hill, a well known citizen of Lexington, died at 8 o'clock last Monday night from heart disease. He leaves a wife and two sons. — It snowed in Charlotte yesterday morning, October 2d, 1888, about 7 o'clock. Although the sun was shining, the air was hazy. A fall of fine snow came down fast for a few minutes, when the sun dispersed it. — As Mr. J. L. Brown, of Berryhill township, was leaving the city for his home yesterday, in company with Mrs. Brown and two children, the horse attached to the buggy became frightened, just beyond the St. Catharine gold mine, and dashed off. The buggy was overturned and Mr. Brown and his family were thrown out. The children escaped unhurt, but Mr. Brown and his wife were badly bruised, Mrs. Brown's injuries being quite serious. News of the accident was sent up town and Mrs. Brown was removed to the residence of Sheriff Cooper, where she was attended by Dr. Misenheimer. The Doctor found that Mrs. Brown's collar bone was broken and two ribs were fractured. Mr. Brown suffered from bruises and contusions. The accident occurred while Mr. Brown was driving down hill, and it was owing to a defective holding back strap that allowed the buggy to run against the horse.
