There is great excitement among the Hebrews of New York over the decision of Grand Rabbi Joseph that a tag must be placed upon the legs of all fowls killed by the Hebrew poultry dealers. It is not the tag that causes the excitement, but the tax of 1 cent that must be paid for the tag. The consumers say that they do not want the tag and cannot afford to pay the tax. They say that if they admit the right of the Grand Rabbi to levy a tax of 1 cent, they will be powerless to prevent him from increasing it to any figure that pleases his fancy.

It is a curious indication of the means which may be commanded by the craziest schemers in this country that the three Chicago Anarchists who were not hanged still have the services of lawyers who are doing all their professional skill can suggest to secure the release of their clients from prison. Their latest effort is based on the technical plea that the sentence of the Court in 1887 was irregular, because the prisoners were not present in person at the time the sentence was pronounced. There is not much reason to suppose that an irregularity of this sort will in the Courts of last resort be allowed to reverse the action of a lower Court in so important a case. And even if the plea should be sustained it is not likely to result in anything but the resentencing of the prisoners.

The announcement that another Antarctic exploring expedition is being fitted out is not calculated greatly to arouse adventurous enthusiasm nor to inspire scientific hopes of valuable results, even though so eminent a man as Prof. Neumayr, of the Hamburg Marine Observatory, be at the head of it. Attempts to reach the North Pole have been chiefly productive of suffering and death, but they have been conducted by easy paths and in pleasant places when compared with the terrors that beset the Antarctic voyager. The warm currents of the North are wholly lacking. Even in midsummer the temperature of the air never rises above the freezing point. Fogs and snows and whirlwinds are almost constantly prevalent. And while lichens and seaweed were found by the most adventurous Northern explorer, there is not the remotest trace of vegetable life, on land or in sea, within seven hundred miles of the South Pole. In brief, there is no reasonable prospect of valuable attainment in An-

tartic research, but only, as Sir Wyville Thompson says, anticipation of disasters, multiplied a hundred fold above the stories of horror in the frozen North.

The Swiss Society of Commercial Geography has discovered some momentous consequences of the discovery of gold in the South African Republic. As long as the wives and daughters of the long-faced and sober-minded Boers were the only white ladies in the Transvaal, the sole demand the fair sex made upon the markets of the world was calico enough for their gowns and sun bonnets. But all this has changed.
