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

DEMOCRACY VS. INTERNAL REV. ENUE.

(BY COL. W. L. SAUNDERS.) We have already seen what our members of Congress have accom plished in changing the internal revenue laws in regard to tobacco. The House Judiciary Committee re ported a bill (Mr. John Henderson's bill) on January 25th, 1888, to amend the internal revenue laws so that there shall be no minimum limit to punishment (of course the maximum that no warrant should be issued on information and belief unless the oath was made by the collector or be returnable in the county where issued, if a judicial officer resides therein, otherwise in the nearest

county where such an officer resides; and such officer shall have exclusive authority to hear the preliminary examination; that the judges may remove United States commissioners; that the commissioner of inter-

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
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
