STATE NEWS.

Newbern Journal: Messrs. Moore & Brady contemplate beginning operations in packing oysters this season as early as November. This industry is a valuable one to the trade of Newbern and to many of our people who are dependent upon their daily labor for bread. The opening of the canning establishment is looked for with interest every season.

Winston Daily: Between 8 and 9 o'clock this morning Mrs. N. T. Watkins left her residence to go to the house of a colored woman near by. While on her way a large tree was blown across the road. It is supposed that a limb of the tree struck Mrs. Watkins about the neck and shoulders, her injuries resulting in instant death.

Lincolnton Courier: Mr. Joe Alexander had his barn burnt down one night last week, together with considerable roughness. Mr. Alexander went to the barn to separate some stock which were fighting. He carried a torch with him and this was accidentally held too near some dry forage, which caught and burnt so rapidly as to make it impossible to extinguish the blaze.

Durham Recorder: A large number of the surviving members of the 6th N. C. Regiment met this morning at Webb & Kramer's factory. The old soldiers were addressed by Col. Tate, Col. Avery, and Maj. York. It was indeed a most interesting gathering, comrades met and conversed of old times when upon the tented field. A survivors Association was formed; Col. Webb elected President with authority to appoint a Vice President from each company.

Greensboro Patriot: When last heard from this afternoon, Mr. Johnny Rees, who had the misfortune to have his shoulder almost shot off by the accidental discharge of a gun while out hunting Tuesday afternoon, was resting very well and the doctor stated that he was getting along as well as could be expected. Rogers, the present Republican Sheriff of Wake, and candidate of his party for re-election, had the sum of \$8,150.10 of the county funds on deposit in the State National Bank of Raleigh at the time of its collapse. This deposit was clearly in defiance of the law upon the subject, as contained in what is known as the "Machinery act" for the collection of revenue, and it is the intention of the Board of County Commissioners to hold the Sheriff to a strict account for this open violation of the statute.

Charlotte Chronicle: The larder of the Thompson Orphanage was robbed one day last week, by a couple of negro men. The two men had a dog with them, and were seen by the matron as they were making off with the booty, but she was alone with nobody near, except the little children, and could do nothing to intercept them. — Mr. J. S. Parker returned yesterday from a trip through Pennsylvania, and says that the Republican majority in that State will be greatly reduced this year. The iron men are going to vote for Cleveland. Mr. Parker visited one large and influential Republican club, whose president is an intimate friend of his, and says that the entire club will vote for Cleveland. "They told me," says Mr. Parker, "that they had lived for a long time under Republican policy, and that they had continually grown poorer and poorer. Now they say they are going to give the Democratic policy a trial, and if it doesn't suit them they will go back to the Republican party." This sentiment prevails among the manufacturers all through Pennsylvania.
