Are there two Durham Tobacco Plants? We received two this morning; one, the regular issue, a Democratic paper, and the other, a half sheet, entitled "Our Sam Jones Issue." Jones, as everybody knows, is running the Republican annex. He is fighting the Democratic party in this State tooth and toe nail. How then can the *Plant*, which claims to be a Democratic paper, conscientiously give aid and support to an enemy of that party? The *Plant* is playing with fire.

Everybody knows how thoroughly conservative the New York *Herald* is, and that it will not pronounce its opinion on any subject unless it is morally sure of what it says. With this premise read the following from the editorial columns of Saturday's issue of that paper:
 The Republicans will kindly drop New Jersey from the list of doubtful States. She will go Democratic in November "as sure as eggs is eggs."
 She always flirts with the Republican party during the off years, but in a Presidential year she is faithful to her true and only love.

Yesterday's New York *Herald* publishes six columns, side by side, each representing the news from a State, gleaned by special reporters for that paper. The six States are Indiana, Connecticut, New Jersey, West Virginia, California and New York. The sub-heads for each State are as follows: For Indiana: All the parties confident—Democrats quietly hopeful—Republicans satisfied and Prohibitionists pugnacious; for Connecticut: Victory pending on Democratic banners on all National issues but the Legislature Republican; for New Jersey: Forecasts of Democratic victory—Farmers and workingmen no longer frightened by Tariff Reform; for West Virginia: The Democratic majority sure though small for Cleveland—Republicans fight only for Senate; for California: Harrison's Chinese record and Tariff Reform carrying the State to Cleveland and victory; for New York: Campaign literature and its effect on the canvass—Cleveland's growing prospects in three counties.

Do you want to know what is the matter with New Jersey? If so, read the following, from the *Herald*, and it will tell you:
 The result of the charter election in Newark on Tuesday "points a moral and adorns a tale" when compared with that of October, 1884. The test vote of party strength was then, as it is now, on Trustee of City Home. The same candidates, Messrs. Peddie, Republican, and Richmond, Democrat, were before the people. The vote of 1884 was: Peddie, 13,511; Richmond, 11,392; Republican majority 2,119. This year the vote stood: Richmond 14,556; Peddie, 13,851; Democratic majority, 705. The cry of "protection" was in full vigor in 1884, and Blaine carried the city by 687.
 The Fifth and Twelfth wards of Newark comprise what is known as the "ironbound district," on account of the large number of factories therein that work in that metal and because the Pennsylvania Railroad skirts the entire west end. This district gave Richmond 825 majority in 1884 and 1,351 majority on Tuesday. It gave Cleveland in 1884 1,020 majority.
 It is no exaggeration to say that fully ninety per cent of the voters of the ironbound district are men who toil for their daily bread. They crowd the political meetings and listen attentively to the arguments of the speakers. The Republicans have made dead set against the district. They sent into it their finest orators, illuminated it with red fire, paraded it with handsomely uniformed clubs, headed by crack brass bands, and disturbed tons of campaign literature through it. When the polls closed last Tuesday George A. Halsey and a score or more of Republican bosses got ready to smile at the gratifying (?) result. They did not smile. Protection has not "caught on" for a cent's worth in the district nor anywhere else in Newark this year.
 Summed up, the result of Tuesday's election in Newark is as follows:
 The Democrats have carried the city for the first time preceeding a Presidential election in thirty years. They have made a net gain of 2,324 over 1884.
 They have made a net gain of 1,073 over 1887.
 They have gained two Aldermen and knocked out the two-third autonomy in the Common Council.
 They have gained three School Commissioners and control of the Board of Education.
 They have scored the first triumph in New Jersey in the cause of tariff reform.
 They have dealt protection a death blow.
 They have got the Republicans on the run and will keep them there,

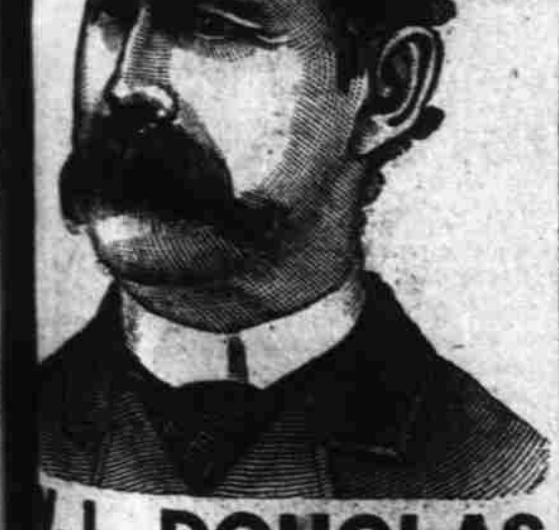
