Buffalo Democrats are betting \$100 to \$60 that Cleveland will carry New York State.

We hear very little about California now but there is some talk of Nevada going Democratic. Nevada casts three votes.

The New York *Star* thinks that Cleveland's plurality in that State will more likely go over 30,000 than under it. The Republicans will have to come down to the city with 100,000 majority and that of course they can't do.

And now the Republicans are getting worried about Ohio. They have heretofore neglected the State, deeming it safe, but the Democrats have been on a still hunt and have found much there to encourage them with hopes of success. The Republicans seem really afraid that the State will go Democratic.

It is stated on pretty good authority that Sir Charles Tupper will succeed Lord Sackville as British Minister to this country. Lord Sackville has been formally cut off from diplomatic relations with the administration and will probably return to England in a few days. He is worth \$100,000 a year and will probably be able to find consolation.

The white man who votes for Oliver H. Dockery should stop in at some blacksmith shop on his way to the polls and get his face smeared over with grease and soot until it is as black as his heart and his conscience. Here is a specimen, taken from the *Chronicle*, of his talk in Charlotte on Monday night:
When his listeners, of a thousand negroes, and the beneficiary of county government, were most enthused, the Colonel, in trying to prove that the Democratic party is the negro party, talked about two colored men being appointed road supervisors in a Democratic county, and that they worked white men under their thumb. Here he was interrupted by a hearty chorus of "That's right! that's right!"

The Democrats are "sassier" than ever. They are talking of carrying Illinois, for sure. Following is a special from Chicago to yesterday's New York *Star*:
The Democrats are enthusiastic over the prospects of carrying the State, and the Republicans are so badly frightened as to beg votes for Fifer on grounds of personal favor. J. G. Steever, of the Cleveland Board of Trade Club, is offering to bet that he can show five converts to Cleveland to one for Harrison in Chicago, and ten to one on the Board of Trade.

It leaked out yesterday that "Boss" Davis had a poll made of Cook county, including Chicago, about a month ago, and found to his mortification that Cleveland had 4,000 majority. Not satisfied, the Republican leaders ordered another canvass, which showed 7,000 for Cleveland. This comes very direct, and is verified by good authority.
Bets even on Cleveland carrying this State are more abundant than ever, and takers few. Some even bet that Palmer will have 10,000 majority.
The Cleveland and Thurman Club of the Board of Trade now number over 1,000, including 100 grain traders, ninety of whom voted for Blaine.

Overcoats for the Guard.
A supply of overcoats for the entire State Guard has been received and the issue will be made as soon as practicable. There are 25 companies to be supplied and as rapidly as companies file their bonds for the overcoats the latter will be issued. The Quartermaster-General hopes to get them all distributed by the 10th of November, at farthest. Gov. Seales desires that the troops should have them at the earliest possible moment, as he very justly regards them as one of the most important articles of a soldier's equipment and the most important of all so far as both health and comfort are concerned. Heretofore some companies of the State Guard have been practically debarred from winter parades, etc., but now this trouble will no longer exist.

City Court.

All Saints.
John Taylor, colored, charged with assault and battery on his wife was fined \$10 or 20 days.

To-morrow is known in the Church Calendar as the Festival of All Saints. It is observed in commemoration of "all good and holy persons who have died in the faith, and were distinguished for their holiness." There will be joint services from the congregations of St. James, St. John and St. Paul at the former church, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon.

No Cause for Alarm.
It is said that a white man in this town, formerly a Democrat, has a list in his possession which is signed by 150 others of the Caucasian race, all agreeing to vote the Republican ticket next Tuesday. He is careful not to show this list. There is no cause for alarm. We are reliably informed that the list shows the name of but one other white man besides his own.

The Federal Court.
The U. S. District Court cleared up its business to-day and adjourned for the term. The grand jury were discharged last night. The case of interest to-day was that of Jacob Greenwald vs the Asheville and Spartanburg Railroad, to recover \$10,000 for injuries sustained in an accident on that road. It was removed to Raleigh to the Circuit Court for trial, a motion for a full bench having been made by the defendants. The case is set for trial on Wednesday, December 5th. For the plaintiff: J. I. Maeks and Russell and Ricard; for defendant: Steadman and Weill, D. Schenck and Thos. Price.

The Flora of This Section.
There is a plant which the florists call *ageratum Mexicana*. They say it was originally from Mexico. It is a very pretty blossom, its clusters being massed in large bunches. It is found in two colors, blue and white. This *Mexican* plant is a native of North Carolina and the woods around Wilmington are now full of it. Only the white is found here but we have found the blue in profusion on the banks of the Roanoke river. In a short drive yesterday we gathered a large quantity of it.
Botanists have said that the flora of this section is in great variety and very fine. It is the finest we have ever found in our limited observation. Florida is called the "Land of 'Flowers'" and yet there are more wood flowers in one square mile around Wilmington than in all of the State of Florida that we have traversed. Our woods are alive with bloom and beauty from the early spring, heralded by the arbutus, the violet, blue and white, flowering moss (peculiar to this section) and the sweet yellow jessamine, to the *ageratum*, and the wild artichoke, which are generally the last to succumb to the approach of the winter.

Rally in the First Ward.

Wm. M. Johnson, colored, charged with illegal registration in the Ward, was before the Mayor this morning. The charge is that he has been disqualified, as he has been an inmate of the County House of Correction. He claims that he was sent there for slander and it is said that he escaped. The case was continued for a fuller investigation.


