STATE NEWS.

Rockingham Rocket: The official vote of Montgomery county, as published in the Vidette, shows that the entire Republican ticket was elected by an average majority of about 100. The majority for Mr. A. M. Logan, Republican candidate for the Senate from this county and Montgomery, is 106, but this is overcome by the majority for Mr. LeGrand in this county, leaving the latter a net majority of 11.

Monroe Enquirer: Mr. Jos. Broom brought into our office yesterday a beat which measured 19 inches in length and 21 in circumference and weighed 11 pounds. It was of the Long Blood Red variety, grown from Buist's seeds. On Tuesday, about 12 o'clock, Mr. John C. Austin's cotton gin, located at his mills, just below the railroad bridge, caught fire. The alarm was given and the Acme Steam Fire Company and the Hook and Ladder Company proceeded to the fire as soon as possible, but arrived too late to save the building, which was destroyed, together with two gins, a Boss cotton press, between two and three bales of cotton and a lot of cotton seed. The total loss amounted to about \$1,000, with no insurance. The fire originated from a match which had gotten in the seed cotton.

Raleigh News and Observer: It is stated that in January the Pullman palace cars will be discontinued on all the lines of the Richmond & Danville road and that the Mann boulevard will be substituted. For weeks past society has been on the alert, and public interest has been thoroughly aroused by the announcement of the approaching marriage of Mr. John H. Winder to Miss Florence P. Tucker, the accomplished daughter of Maj. R. S. Tucker, all of this city. Both parties are favorites, not only in this their home, but wherever they are known. The brilliancy of the bride, the elegant courtesy of the groom and his prominence in business circles have all combined to make them universal favorites. The happy event was consummated last evening in Christ Church, in this city, and rarely has that edifice been more densely thronged.

Greenville Reflector: Only a little over two weeks now and the Court House will be swept entirely clean of those men who have so long ruled and demoralized Pitt county politics. At 6 o'clock this morning at the residence of Mr. H. A. Sutton, father of the bride, Mr. D. J. Whichard, editor of the Reflector, was married to Miss Hennie W. Sutton, Rev. J. W. Wildman officiating. Immediately after the ceremony the bride and groom left for Richmond to attend the exposition. When Mr. D. J. James was nominated as Register of Deeds, Mr. L. H. Wilson, the Republican candidate, was heard to remark: "I can stay home and not go out of my house during the campaign and beat him by a big majority." To the contrary, he worked as hard as ever a man worked, and Mr. James' majority was just 141. So it turns out that Wilson waited until after the election to do his staying home.

The richest specimens of gold ore that have been seen in this section in many a day were exhibited yesterday by Esquire John P. Hunter, of Mallard Creek township. He had a peck measure full of rocks, and virgin gold fairly honey-combed the rocks. Old miners say that it is the richest ever seen in this State. Mr. Hunter found the ore on his farm, and if a good vein is developed his fortune is made. Mr. R. Z. Linney sat down to a nice dish at a banquet in Taylorsville the other night. His friends gave him a "possum supper, in honor of Harrison's election, and somebody took occasion to play a mean trick on him. A big fat cat was killed and baked and slyly substituted for one of the 'possums, and it happened that the substitute was placed in front of Mr. Linney. The animal was a little tough, but no one at the table knew its true character until after the feast. The party who is responsible for the trick is not known, and it is probably good for his health that such is the case. It is reported that both Mr. Linney and Will Boger dined on the cat.

Wadesboro Messenger: R. E. Little, Esq., who will represent the 27th Senatorial district, composed of the counties of Anson and Union, in the next General Assembly, will be the best elected Senator in that body. His majority in Anson is 1,353, and he beats his opponent in Union 1,259, making his majority 2,612. The residence of Mr. Thomas Trull, who lives on the plantation of Mr. D. Maske, in Lanesboro township, was burned last Thursday night, together with the household and kitchen furniture and about a bale of cotton. In the same township, last Monday morning, the dwelling of Mr. Lawton Allen was burned. There was no one at the house at the time, and nothing was saved but one feather bed. The fire is supposed to have caught from the chimney. Last Thursday night, while the Democrats of Ansonville were celebrating the victory of their party in the county and State, some fiend applied the torch to the house of Mr. E. M. Eason, which was occupied by Mr. C. A. Smith and his mother. There was no one in the building when the fire was discovered, and before assistance could be procured the fire had gained such headway that nothing was saved but one feather bed and a quilt or two. As the fire was discovered in a portion of the building in which there had been no fire for some time, it was undoubtedly the work of an incendiary, and it is generally believed by the good people of that section to have been the work of some Republican negro. The building and furniture were both insured.
