Mr. Hallison is said to be uneasy and dissatisfied because he fears that he has not got the whole hog. A majority in the House, even a very small majority, is a very good thing to have and if there is any of that campaign boodle left over the Republicans would probably be willing to give it all to get the covered majority.
