Mr. F. M. Wescott, a farmer in Brunswick county, near Southport, shipped to Wilmington this morning by the steamer Louise 3 bales of cotton. Wm. Brown, an enterprising colored farmer of the same county, shipped one bale.

Oysters continue scarce and high. New River sold to-day at \$1.30 per gallon and they were few and inferior at that. Scalded sound oysters sell now at 30 cents per quart. The tides have been high but they are lower now and the oysters will be cheaper by Saturday.

Col. L. C. Jones, General Superintendent of the C. C. R. R., whose duties have kept him absent from this city for several months continuously, is now in Baltimore. He says that he will return to Wilmington next week and open business at the old stand.

Exports Foreign.  
Br. steamship Thalia, Fleetham, cleared to-day for Liverpool, with 5,192 bales of cotton, valued at \$236,700, shipped by Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son, Schr. Susie P. Olive, Snare, cleared for Port de France, Mart., with 247,775 feet lumber, valued at \$1,199, shipped by Mr. E. Kidder's Son.

The Educated Horses.  
We understand that Prof. Burk and his celebrated equine college, consisting of twenty educated horses, ponies and mules, will not arrive here until to-morrow evening and therefore the first performance will be given to-morrow night. It is a show well worth seeing, by old and young alike. It appears here but two nights.

Another Assignment.  
It was announced yesterday afternoon that Mr. W. H. Styron, dealer in tobacco and cigars and boots and shoes, had assigned to Mr. E. G. Barker. The liabilities are stated at between \$25,000 and \$40,000. No estimate is given of assets. There are two preferred creditors—S. Behrends of the firm of Behrends & Monroe, \$4,000, and the Bank of New Hanover of this city, \$1,000. Five attachments were issued by Northern creditors—four before the assignment—aggregating \$5,000.

### December Weather.

We have received from the U. S. Signal Office its weather chart for Wilmington; showing the changes in temperature, &c., to be expected during the month of December, as deduced from observations here during that month for the past 17 years. We notice that it gets warmer about the 5th, followed by slightly cooler between the 7th and 10th, then warmer up to the 13th, after which decidedly colder between the 15th and 20th, and more so between the 25th and 31st. The maximum temperature here during December was 78 degrees in 1879. The minimum, 10 degrees in 1880. Clear and cloudy days occur 1 in 3, and it rains 1 day in each 3, with a daily rainfall of .13 of an inch. The winds are generally from southwest at the rate of about seven miles an hour. The maximum velocity of wind here during December was 43 miles, northwest, in 1876, and greatest daily rainfall 3.98 inches in 1877. The changes in temperature as prognosticated from these charts have been found to hit close to the mark, and the fact deserves consideration.
