

A week after leaving college Col. Bridgers was licensed to practice law. In 1844 he was a member of the lower house in the Legislature from Edgecombe county and was a member of the Judiciary Committee, and in 1856 he was again a member of the legislative body and con tinued to represent his county until 1861. During the war he was a mem ber of the Confederate Congress and in 1865 he was called to the management of the affairs of the Wilming ton and Weldon Railroad as its President, and afterwards became also President of the Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta Railroad It was in these responsible positions that Col. Bridgers' high executive abilities made themselves known and thoroughly felt, as is attested by the great degree of prosperity to which these roads have attained. He was also president of the Albermarle and Raleigh Railroad, of the Wilmington Railway Bridge Company and of the Navassa Guano Company.

Col. Bridgers was a large hearted, patriotic North Carolinian, true to the best interests of the State of his birth and foremost in every effort to advance its interests and prosperity. His death is a public calam
