LOCAL NEWS.

Contrary to expectations the threatened disagreeable weather has passed us by and this has been as bright and pretty a day as the heart of man could desire.

The gutter on the North side of Market street, opposite this office, is like unto a stagnant pond. The merchants have complained and relief has been promised but its status remains unchanged.

Some attempt should be made to have a better roadway to Pine Forest Cemetery, on Red Cross street. The sand is very heavy. Clay could be had near the Eastern terminus of the street.

A party of young men from this city took a jaunt down to Federal Point Sound on Saturday night, leaving here at 9 o'clock and arriving there at 2. They camped out and yesterday had a quiet, pleasant day, storing away all of the oysters they could hold.

The Democrats in the Legislature are to caucus to-morrow night on the Senatorial nomination and we will probably know on Wednesday who is to be Gen. Ransom's successor, whether himself, or some other.

A fine assortment of household furniture will be offered for sale at auction by Messrs. Cronly & Morris, at their salesroom, No. 19 South Water street, on Wednesday at 11 o'clock. It can be examined previous to the sale.

The building for the new fibre factory of the Acme Manufacturing Co's. works, at Cronly, is about completed and ready for the machinery. It will be the middle of February' though, before work will be begun in it.

Information was received here today of another railroad horror. This time it was a collision on the New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio Railroad, 2 1/2 miles East of Talmadge. It occurred this morning. The engineer of one of the trains, a fireman, a baggage master, an express messenger and twelve passengers were killed. These were all of the particulars we could learn.

What has become of the scheme to macadamize Market street road, from the Eastern terminus of the city to the National Cemetery? A year ago we were told that the bill had been favorably considered in Committee and was about to pass the House, but so far it does not seem to have left the Committee. We hope Col. Rowland will look into this matter again and try and get us the appropriation.

The receipts of cotton at this port today foot up 306 bales.
