

Somebody has figured out that the hind buttons used on the coats worn in America cost \$2,320,000 a year, and are of no earthly account.

The strawberry crop about Charleston is very promising. Some of the plants are already in blossom and if a hard freeze does not knock them out the crop this year will be early and large.

The record of divorces for the year in the Courts of Philadelphia shows that the matrimonial union was dissolved in 241 cases; and the divorce docket still contains a long list of applicants.

The new American navy, when completed, will consist of 22 vessels, ranging from the armored cruiser, Maine, carrying 444 men, down to a first-class torpedo boat, carrying 4 officers and 18 men. There will be 5,786 men on board the 22 vessels-500 officers and 5,286 sailors and marines.

The publication of an Indianapolis special to a New York paper, which quoted Ex-Senator Henry G. Davis as classing himself as a Republican, has elicted from that gentleman the statement that the assertion "has no foundation in fact." Mr. Davis says his "political sentiments have undergone no change."

Stedman yielded his position to Col. Holt. The proceedings were very interesting and were largely attended. There were but five military companies in attendance and the Wilmington Light Infantry received many compliments for their soldiery appearance and discipline. The Germania Cornet Band discoursed some of their best music and were also highly complimented. Judge Fowle's inauguration was very fine and to the point and was received with every demonstration of favor He is now Governor of the State and regularly in harness.
