IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The Senate resumed the consideration of the tariff bill, the pending question being on the amendments to the tin plate paragraph. Finally a vote was taken and the amendment was adopted—yeas 25, nays 18—Mr. Brown voting aye.

The amendment proposing a bounty on sugar made from beets, sorghum, or sugar cane grown in the United States, was then taken up. No vote was reached, and after a short executive session the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
The House was informed that Gov. Hovey's resignation, as a Representative, had been received at Indianapolis and accepted.

A committee was appointed to investigate the purchase of real estate by the Commissioner of the District of Columbia.

Consideration of the Territorial bill was resumed, and speeches were made in turn by the advocates of every proposition that has been brought forward.

House bill 8,466 was then received as a substitute.

Mr. Springer then asked unanimous consent that the previous substitute offered by him (one providing for the division of Dakota), be considered in its stead, which was given.

Mr. McDonald, of Minnesota, then offered his substitute for Mr. Springer's proposition. (This substitute embodies the principal features of the Omnibus bill, except that it provides for the immediate admission of South Dakota.)

Pending its reading the House adjourned.
