IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Mr. Hale, from the Census Committee, reported back with sundry amendments House bill providing for taking the eleventh and subsequent censuses, and gave notice that he would, at an early day, ask the Senate to proceed to its consideration.

Mr. Sherman, from the Committee on Foreign Relations, reported two amendments to the Diplomatic and Consular Appropriation bill, to protect the interests of the United States in the Samoan Islands.

Mr. Saulsbury, from the same committee, reported a bill further to fulfill the obligations in regard to the Guano Islands. Calendar.

On motion of Mr. Hoar, a concurrent resolution for the counting of the electoral vote was taken up and passed. It provides that the two Houses of Congress shall assemble in the hall of the House of Representatives on Wednesday, the 13th day of February, 1889, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, pursuant to the requirements of the Constitution and laws relating to the election of President and Vice President of the United States, and the President of the Senate shall be the presiding officer; that two persons be appointed tellers on the part of the Senate, and two on the part of the House of Representatives, to make a list of the votes as they shall be declared; that the result shall be declared by the President of the Senate, who shall announce the state of the vote and the persons elected to the two Houses assembled as aforesaid, which shall be deemed a declaration of the persons elected President and Vice President of the United States, and together with a list of the votes entered in the Journals of the two Houses.

The bill to declare unlawful trusts and combinations in restraint of trade and promotion was taken up for consideration, and was amended by striking out of the first section the words, "that competes with any similar article upon which duty is levied by the United States," and inserting in lieu thereof the words: "in due course of trade." The bill then went over till to-morrow to allow Mr. Hoar to offer some amendment to it, which will increase its stringency.

House bill for the relief of the State National Bank of New Orleans, formerly the Louisiana State Bank, was taken up and passed. It merely authorizes the Court of Claims to take jurisdiction of the banks claim for proceeds of cotton seized and sold after the war closed.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Immediately after the reading of the Journal the House went into Committee of the Whole, on the Sundry Civil Appropriation bill, but the Committee rose without action and the House adjourned.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

(Star Report Condensed.)
RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 23.—After the announcement of the result of the Senatorial election in joint session to-day, the Senate resumed business.

The resolution offering a premium for the largest quantity of grain per acre was indefinitely postponed. The following bills passed a final reading: To incorporate the State Bank of Commerce at Hendersonville; for protection of oysters in Pamlico and Roanoke sounds, (makes it unlawful to take oysters except for immediate use and for sale in markets in North Carolina); for the establishment of a patrol for oyster beds; to incorporate Bethany College, Robeson county; to provide additional educational facilities for the Croatan Indians of Robeson county, (excludes from their schools negroes to the fourth generation); for the relief of E. W. Taylor, sheriff of Brunswick.

HOUSE.—The Committee on Privileges and Elections reported in favor of sitting members Anthony and Taylor.
A resolution was introduced giving

ing the public printing to the lowest bidder.
Bill making changes in the public school law as agreed on by the Committee on Education, is as follows: The County Superintendent is made treasurer of the School Fund; the school year to end the last day of June, and all reports must correspond thereto. The County Commissioners of each county, in joint session with the Justices of the Peace, may submit to the people the question whether a school tax shall be levied not exceeding one-fifth of one per cent on property, and sixty cents on the poll.
