Sehr. Cyrus Hall, Coomb, cleared to day for Port of Spain, Trinidad, with 385,748 feet lumber, valued at \$6,895.55, shipped by Mr. E. Kidder's Son.

Prof. Palmer, one of the skilled Glass Blowers, was presented with a handsome bouquet yesterday afternoon, and last night some one took it from his table while he was busy giving out presents.

A Painful Accident.
Mr. Thos. Taylor, mate of the steam tug *Marle*, had the misfortune to get his right hand caught in one of the chops of the bow of the boat while the rope was being pulled through and two of his fingers were badly mashed. The accident occurred this morning.

To Begin on Monday.
Work on the Cape Fear river and bar will be resumed in a very few days. The first lick will be struck on Monday next, when the *Woodsbury*, the suction dredge belonging to the government, will begin on Bald Head bar. On the following Monday, February 11th, the clam shell dredges *Pugh* and *Vin* will be placed at work on the Alligator shoals, in the river, under the contract recently made with the Atlas Dredging Co.

The Glass Blowers.
The contest for the baby prize at the Glass Blowers waxed warmer last night than ever, as there was a very large crowd. Johnnie Owens received 98 votes, making a total of 303, and Lizzie Gilbert 65, making 253. Last night there were ten more babies entered the contest, making 73 in all. The main feature last night was a handsome prize made by Madam Nora for the most popular young lady, which was won by Miss Carrie Levy; there were ten young ladies in the contest. Miss Levy received 21 votes out of 50. To night there will be a Turkish pipe valued at \$12 rewarded the homeliest man in the city. There are no candidates from this office.

Meteorological.
The summary for the month of January at this place, as furnished by the Signal Office, is as follows: Average monthly barometer, 30.08 inches; highest, 30.45 on the 22d; lowest 29.52, on the 27th. Monthly mean temperature, 47.50 degrees; highest, 69.2, on the 18th; lowest, 28.6, on the 30th. Monthly mean dew point, 40.8; monthly average humidity 78.4 per cent.

Average hourly wind velocity six miles; direction notheast. Highest velocity 38 miles an hour; direction southwest, on the 27th.

Total rainfall, 6.85 inches; average daily rainfall 0.92.

There were seven cloudless days, eight partly cloudy and 16 cloudy. Number of days upon which rain fell, 10. There were five lunar halos observed during the month and one solar halo.

What the American Sabbath Union is.
In response to a petition circulated by Rev. Wilbur F. Crofts, the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church (North), took the initiative by inviting other ecclesiastical bodies to appoint members on a National Sabbath Committee. This invitation was responded to by the Baptists, Northern and Southern Presbyterians, United Presbyterians, Reformed (Dutch), and (unofficially) by the Methodist Protestant and Congregational churches. The representatives of these bodies met and organized the American Sabbath Union. While having a distinctly religious basis it seeks the cooperation of all friends of Sunday rest, whether they can agree on its religious basis or not. Thus, its Sunday Rest Petition has been endorsed by Cardinal Gibbons, and by Dr. Conrad, of the *Lutheran Observer*, who, perhaps, would put Sunday observance on different grounds from the Union, and by many labor organizations, who advocate it independently of all religious considerations. Its aim is to secure to all men the freedom of the Sabbath, and not to compel men to observe it religiously.
Rev. Peyton H. Hoge, of this city, is Vice-President of the Union for the State of North Carolina, and Rev. Wilbur F. Crofts, the Field Secretary, will address the citizens at the Opera House, Sunday, at 4:30 p. m., on the "National Sunday Rest Movement."

Harbor Master's Report.
The following is the report for the month of January of arrivals at this port, taken from the books of Capt. Jos. Price, Harbor Master:
American—8 steamers and 12 schooners, 9,424 tons; Foreign—14 barques, 2 brigs and 2 schooners, 6,705 tons. Total 38 vessels and 16,129 tons.

The Gallant Third.
That was a very interesting sketch of the Third N. C. Infantry as it appears in the *Messenger* this morning, although it is brief and incomplete and in some instances inaccurate. Maj. McClumny was never in the Regiment, Col. Thruston's name is misspelled, as is also that of Col. Parsley. One or two of those mentioned were with the Regiment for a brief time only and there are many other names, both of the living and the dead, which are omitted. We recall those of Ed. Meares, John VanBokkelen, Tom Wright, Josh. Walker, Bob McRee, Cicero Craig and Tob. Garrison of the dead, and Rev. Dr. Patterson, John Cowan, R. F. Langdon, Dr. T. F. Wood, James Metts, Armand DeRosset, Dr. Porter, Maj. E. Ennett and others who are yet spared, all of whom were with the Regiment in its most arduous campaigns and hottest fights. There was no more gallant regiment of troops in the Confederate army, none which did more active service, from first to last, none more battle-scarred and none with a record more gallantly won, more glorious or more imperishable. They were mustered in 1861, not for twelve months, but for the war, and they stuck like tigers to the very last at Appomattox. Its officers were all from the same section, many from the same city, and some of the best blood of the Cape Fear throbbed in their veins. Many of them were relatives and all of them were friends. The same spirit pervaded, in a large degree, the men in the ranks, and there was but little insubordination and few desertions. They fought for four years and starved, decimated and hopeless as they were they would gallantly have fought for four years more, rather than have surrendered to Grant at Appomattox. If we recollect rightly—and we write entirely from memory—the first field officers were as follows: Gaston Meares, Colonel; Robt. H. Cowan, Lieutenant Colonel; W. L. DeRosset, Major. Col. Cowan accepted the command of the gallant 18th N. C. in April, 1862, and Col. DeRosset became Lieut. Colonel and Capt. (Dr.) S. L. Thruston, Major. Col. Gaston Meares was killed and Col. DeRosset rose to the command with Maj. Thruston as Lieut. Colonel and Capt. W. M. Parsley as Major. When Col. DeRosset resigned Thruston was made Colonel Parsley Lt. Colonel, and Capt. (Dr.) W. T. Ennett, Major. This was the field status of the Regiment at the close of the war, Lt. Col. Parsley having been killed a few days before the surrender. Of all of the above, but three are alive to-day. Col. W. L. DeRosset, of this city, Col. S. D. Thruston, of Texas, and Dr. W. T. Ennett, of Burgaw.
