Services in the Lutheran Church.
To-morrow (Ash Wednesday) at 4 p. m., there will be English services in St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, corner Sixth and Market streets.

Mr. Jno. F. Garrell has on his stalls now in Front Street Market some of the prettiest beef we have seen there since Christmas. He has two car loads on hand, one from Western North Carolina and one from Western Virginia and some of the bees weigh as much as 1,500 pounds, the average being 1,100. It will be on sale every day this week.

Prof. Tripp's Lecture.
The first of the series of historical lectures by Prof. Alonzo Tripp was given in Luther Memorial Hall last evening and it was largely attended by an interested and cultured audience. The lecture was confined principally to the truly romantic career of Louis Napoleon, tracing all of the flights of his daring ambition to the great collapse which overtook him at Sedan and speaking of his marriage to the beautiful Eugenie, Countess Montijo and giving also a touching description of the death of the Prince Imperial in Zululand. The lecture was illustrated by means of handsome maps. The Professor will speak this evening of the Eastern question, which will also be illustrated by maps, and Miss Minna Schwarz will sing some beautiful selections.

Board of Aldermen.
The last regular meeting of the present Board of Aldermen was held yesterday afternoon at the City Hall. All the members of the Board were present, Mayor Fowler presiding.

Alderman Pearsall, from the Streets and Wharves Committee, reported that approval had been given to the application of the C. F. & Y. V. R. Co. for the establishment of a water front on the west side of the river, as recommended by the commissioners of navigation and engineers. The report was received and ordered entered upon the records.

Alderman Pearsall, from the same committee, reported the completion of the Belgian block pavement on North Front street, to the line of Red Cross, and stated that the Atlantic Coast Line had agreed to continue the paving from that point to the bridge. The total cost of paving the three blocks and four intersections is \$10,900.68, and all the work was done by home labor and all the money expended at home.

The Sanitary Committee, through Alderman Pearsall, reported favorably upon the proposition to purchase a cremator and recommended that a furnace best suited to the needs of the city be purchased and a site selected. The report was adopted.

Alderman Dudley submitted the report of the special committee to recommend registrars and poll-holders for the municipal election as follows:

On motion of Alderman Saunpson the report was adopted.

Reports of the Chief of Fire Department and Superintendent of Health were ordered on file.

Alderman Fishblate submitted a resolution relative to the city subscription to the Wilmington, Onslow & E. C. Railroad—that the bonds be called in and cancelled, unless work on the road is resumed in good faith, within four months.

Alderman Fishblate spoke in favor of the resolution and moved its adoption, and Alderman King seconded the motion.

Alderman Pearsall moved to amend by striking out the words "four months," but agreed to an amendment changing the time to two months.

Alderman Ricard spoke against the amendment. He understood, from good authority, that the road had been sold to responsible parties who had abundant capital and who intended to build it; but, he argued, it was unreasonable to require them to prepare their plans and go to work within sixty days. He thought that at least ninety days should be allowed.

After further debate the amendment offered by Alderman Pearsall was rejected, and the resolution as submitted by Alderman Fishblate was adopted.

Alderman Fishblate read a communication from the President of the Water Works Company, in which it was stated that if seven additional fire hydrants are authorized in that section of the city East of Fourth street, so that hydrants shall not be more than 400 feet apart, the company would put in larger mains, and give better service. The additional cost to the city would be \$50 per annum for each hydrant put in.

After debate, on motion of Alderman Fishblate, the proposition of the Water Works Co. was accepted. Alderman Ricard moved that the appeal of police officer Knold, from the decision of the Mayor, removing the officer from the force, be referred to the Police Committee with power to act. Adopted.

On motion of Alderman Ricard, the ordinance in relation to the lease of a lot for ninety-nine years to the Wilmington Light Infantry was

amended so as to extend the time for the completion of the building, etc.

Alderman Walker called the attention of the Committee on Streets to the bad condition of Fifth and Sixth, near Campbell street, where pools of water are standing, and Alderman King called attention to a similar condition on Chestnut street.

Alderman Fishblate said that the streets in the upper part of the city were in a worse condition now than they had ever been.

A plan was submitted for proposed improvement of Market, between First and Second streets, which the Board of Audit and Finance have authorized to be paved—to leave a space in the center of the street for a grass plat. The matter was discussed, but no action was taken.

Alderman Pearsall presented a proposition from Mr. M. S. Willard in regard to the obstruction of Ann street, near Second, by a house owned by Mr. Willard, that the city cooperate in its removal to the line of the street. The matter was debated but no action was taken.

Audit and Finance.
The Board of Audit and Finance met yesterday in regular session. Present, Messrs. R. J. Jones, chairman, and W. I. Gore, Wm. Calder, J. W. Hewitt and J. F. Maunder.

Bill for gas for Fire Department was approved, and the clerk was directed to address a communication to the Chief of the Department notifying him that the appropriation for this purpose is exhausted and asking him if they cannot economize in lights.

Bill of W. H. Bernard (\$36.35) was referred to the Mayor.

Bill for hose reel for Atlantic engineering company (\$450) was ordered returned and original bill called for.

Bills were audited and approved: For current expenses \$5,309.83; coupons \$11,980; quarantine expenses \$141. Total \$17,439.83. Seven hundred and thirty seven coupons were burned in the presence of the Board.

County Commissioners.
The Board met yesterday afternoon in monthly session. All the members of the Board were present.

The Treasurer submitted his monthly report, showing a balance in bank to the credit of the educational and general funds amounting to \$47,219.87.

The Register of Deeds submitted his report for the month of February, showing receipts from marriage licenses amounting to \$12.83.

Application of Chas. Wessell for license to retail liquors at store, corner of Mulberry and Water streets, was ordered not granted.

W. R. French, Clerk of the Criminal Court, offered his official bond, in the sum of \$10,000, with Jno. W. Atkinson and Wm. Calder as sureties, and it was received and ordered recorded.

The following were drawn as jurors for the April term of the Superior Court, viz:

An order was made to lay off a public road from a point near the seven-mile post on the Newbern road to Jno. L. Corbett's landing, and the sheriff was directed to summon a jury of five disinterested freeholders to lay off the road and assess the damages.

Chamber of Industry.
The Chamber met last evening at the City Hall for the purpose of effecting a permanent organization.

Mr. John D. Bellamy, Jr., was in the chair and Mr. Hugh McRae acted as secretary.

The Committee on By Laws and Rules submitted a report, which was considered by sections and adopted.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President—Oscar Pearsall; Vice Presidents—Wm. A. French, John D. Bellamy, Jr., and R. W. Hicks; Secretary—J. M. Forshee; Treasurer—Chas. W. Worth; Directors—Chas. M. Stedman, A. D. Wessell, Chas. E. Bordon, Hugh MacRae, J. A. Bonitz, Harry Walters, J. A. Springer, W. R. Barksdale and C. P. Mebane.

The President will appoint the following committees:—On Legislation; on Manufacturing; on Advertising; and on Membership.

The membership fees were fixed at fifty cents a month, and the money thus realized is to be expended in advertising the city advantages for manufacturing and commerce.

Mr. Chas. M. Stedman reported that the committee, consisting of himself and Mr. J. A. Bonitz, had forwarded a protest on behalf of the Chamber of Industry to Washington in reference to the inadequate dimensions and capacity of the public building now under contract, but had received no satisfactory assurance that any change in the plans, or increase in size of the building, would be made at present.

The tax question and the unequal tax valuation were discussed and considered and referred to the Legislative Committee.

On motion Messrs. W. A. French and John D. Bellamy were constituted a committee to forward a protest to the General Assembly against the proposed enactment placing a tax of \$50 a month upon traveling salesmen as ruinous and detrimental to the wholesale trade of North Carolina.
