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

The unveiling of the monument which is to be erected at Indianapolis, and which has been purchased by the voluntary contributions of admirers throughout the country of Indiana's distinguished statesmau, the Hon. Thomas A. Hendricks, will take place in the autumn, probably some time in October. The Hon. A. G. Thurman, of Ohio, who was the close political and personal friend of Mr. Hendricks, will deliver the oration, and as it will be a labor of love it will doubtless be worthy of himself and his subject. The erection of the monument will be begun early in July, and it will stand on the State House grounds. The monument will consist of a statue of Mr. Hendricks, fourteen feet high, in bronze, cast in one piece at the royal foundry in Rome, the pedestal of red tinted granite, taken from the Bavoni quarries on Lake Como, Italy, and the figure of History in a sitting posture, of course, set within the pedestal in front, and perhaps the additional figure of Justice on the opposite side of the pedestal. All the work on the pedestal has also been done on the other side of the water, and the blocks will be shipped ready for erection. The figure of History will likewise be in bronze and eight feet high.
