

It is probably the equinoctial storm, a little in advance of the season. The signal office here reports the amount of rainfall since 3 p. m, yesterday to be 1.40 inches. The greatest velocity of wind was at about 2:30 p.m., when it blew at the rate of 26 miles per thour from the Northeast. We have "no report of the amount of rainfall at Southport since yesterday, but the wind there at one time to day blew at the rate of 48 miles per hour and it has been blowing nearly all day at an average rate of 36 miles per hour. We have heard of no damage as yet of shipping at Southport or along the coast.
