High Winds Expected. At 10.15 o'clock this morning a special bulletin was received from Washington ordering up the Northeast storm signals for Wilmington and Wilmington section. At that hour the storm was central off the North Carolina coast. Northeast signals were also ordered up at Charleston and Morehead City.

Governor Fowle. In accordance with the announcement previously made through the press, His Excellency, Governor Fowle, accompanied by his staff, members of his political and domestic household and other notable North Carolinians, arrived in the city yesterday at 6 o'clock p. m. on the Southern bound train on the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad. The distinguished visitors were Gov. Fowle and his daughter, Miss Helen W. Fowle; Miss Annie E. Satherwaite, Miss Annie Walker, Mrs. W. H. Williams and J. S. Cunningham, aides-de-camp; S. F. Telfair, private secretary; Gen. James D. Glenn, Adjutant General; Col. F. H. Cameron, Inspector General; Col. F. A. Olds, Quartermaster General; Col. Hubert Haywood, Surgeon General; Capt. B. Cameron, Assistant Inspector General; Capt. Wm. B. Grimes, Assistant Quartermaster General, and Capt. Reid Whitford, Assistant Engineer. Col. T. W. Strange, of the Governor's staff, and Col. W. C. Jones, of the Second Regiment, N. C. S. G., who went to Raleigh to escort the Governor to Wilmington, were of the party, as were also Col. W. L. DeRosset and Hon. O. P. Meares, who met the distinguished visitors at South Washington.

Expectation had been roused and a determination on the part of the ladies and gentlemen of the city to show the distinguished visitors every attention and honor was everywhere apparent, and, although the evening was not pleasant, as the time drew near for the arrival of the train, a large throng of ladies and gentlemen assembled at Front street depot to bid cordial welcome to the Governor and his party. The several committees appointed by our citizens were there, and a committee of ladies, consisting of Mrs. W. A. Bryan and Misses Mary DeRosset, Agnes Daniel, Jessie Kenan and Addie Riddick, were in attendance to bid a hearty welcome to the ladies of the Governor's party. The Wilmington Light Infantry, fifty strong, in full uniform and under the command of Capt. John H. Daniel, was there and as the Governor and his party emerged from the depot, the company opened ranks and the city's honored guests passed between them, preceded by the Germania Cornet Band playing "The Old North State." Being all seated in carriages which had been provided for the occasion the party were escorted by the Wilmington Light Infantry and Germania Cornet Band to the Orton House. The street was lined the entire distance with people of both sexes and of all ages and colors, who were anxious to get a peep at North Carolina's Governor and who were also attracted by the fine appearance, soldierly bearing and perfect movements of our citizen soldiers.

The elegant and commodious parlors of the Orton House presented an unusual and even fascinating appearance last night, where the Governor with Miss Helen W. Fowle, Miss Annie E. Satherwaite and Miss Annie Walker, assisted by Miss Annie Meares, Miss Jennie Vernon and Miss Murchison, held a reception. The Governor's staff were present in full uniform, and the throng of constantly moving and always happy looking visitors, many of them ladies in all the radiant beauty, queenly dignity and ineffable sweetness of North Carolina womanhood, was a pleasing picture to which the United States and State flags, held by privates Hedrick and Ulrich of the Light Infantry, formed a fitting and appropriate background. The reception lasted about two hours when the Governor and his party retired to their rooms to seek needed rest.

This morning loomed up gloomy and rainy enough to dampen the ardor of almost any reasonable pleasure seeker and to confine within doors all who were not compelled by business necessities to wade through the mud and face the pelted rain, yet, for all this, as the arrangements for the day had been perfected, the Governor and party felt obliged to visit Wrightsville. It was intended that the train which was to bear the distinguished visitors to the Sound should leave Princess street depot at 11 a. m., but on account of a necessary delay occasioned by the non-arrival of some of those who were to

be of the party, it did not leave until 11:35 a. m. Accompanying the Governor to Wrightsville were his daughter, Miss Helen W. Fowle, Miss Satterthwaite, Miss Vernon, of Brooklyn, N. Y., Miss Annie Meares, Miss Agnes Daniel, Gen. J. D. Glenn, Adjutant General; Col. F. H. Cameron, Inspector General; Col. F. A. Olds, Quartermaster General; Col. J. L. Cantwell, Commissary General; Col. Hubert Haywood, Surgeon General; Capt. W. B. Grimes, Assistant Quartermaster General; Capt. B. Cameron, Assistant Inspector General; Col. S. J. Cunningham, W. H. Williams and T. W. Strange, aides-de-camp; S. F. Telfair, Private Secretary; Capt. Reid Whitford, Assistant Engineer; Mr. G. D. Anderson, Draughtsman; Col. W. C. Jones, Second Regiment N. C. S. G.; ex Lieut. Gov. C. M. Stedman, Col. John D. Taylor, B. R. Moore, F. W. Kerchner, T. C. McIlhenny, W. L. DeRosset, Maj. R. M. McIntire, Capt. W. H. Bixby, Capt. A. L. DeRosset, Capt. J. H. Daniel, Hon. O. P. Meares, Dr. E. S. Pigford, and Messrs. Donald MacRae, D. G. Worth, E. S. Latimer, J. H. Watters, N. Jacobi, W. R. French, J. K. Williams, D. T. Cronly, R. S. French, H. M. A run of a few minutes brought the party to Wrightsville, where they disembarked and entered carriages that were in readiness to convey them to the proposed encampment grounds and where they soon arrived. By this time the rain was falling rapidly and the wind was blowing almost with the violence of a gale from the Northeastward, so that the trip to the grounds was anything but pleasant, yet they all braved the elements, and even the ladies of the party, with a heroism worthy of emulation, nothing daunted by the rough pelting of the rain nor the rude assaults of the turbulent wind, dared the storm with the determination of "woman's will," and it really seemed as if the lovely creatures bore the inconveniences and vicissitudes attending such a journey under such unpropitious circumstances as well as their gentlemen escorts.

There are two sites at Wrightsville, each containing about sixty acres, either of which possesses all the requirements for the encampment grounds, and one of which will probably be selected. Both of these sites are on the land of Messrs. H. M. Bowden and Wm. Larkins, one being about three eighths of a mile and the other about three fourths of a mile from Wrightsville depot, in a Northeasterly direction. They are desirable locations, possessing every facility and convenience necessary for encampment purposes. The Governor and his party went over and examined both sites, and will probably determine either to day or to morrow which of the two will be selected. As quick as this important matter is decided the title will be made out and the property will pass from its present owners to the State of North Carolina.

Provided, That at the next municipal election, to be held March 28th, 1890, a majority of the registered voters cast their votes in favor of said appropriation.

The conditions are such that a Board of Trustees, composed of Donald MacRae, D. G. Worth, James H. Chadbourne, William A. French, Oscar Pearsall, Lurr Vollers and Clayton Giles, shall have charge of the fund, and are authorized to donate annually for ten years, to any manufacturer erecting new factories, or enlarging old ones, an amount not exceeding the municipal tax on the increased valuation so produced. mar 13 10c
