The claim of Canada that the Alaska boundary is about ninety miles out of the way would be important enough in any case, but is made much more so by the fact that the disputed territory covers the best part of the gold fields yet found. At present our authorities are acting under the supposition that their own maps are correct, and this supposition will be maintained until accuracy is shown. Although the seals and the salmon of Alaska were more counted upon than its minerals in our purchase of the Territory, yet the Yukon gold district is certainly valuable, and will be resorted to by a greater number of miners as it becomes more accessible. About three hundred miners were there in the summer of 1887. The existence of this boundary controversy is a menace to international peace, or at least a fruitful source of local trouble and international complications. At present there is no taxing of land in Alaska, so that some sources of trouble are avoided, but the true boundary should be promptly determined.

The regions of Western Kentucky are being overrun with a peculiar epidemic disease that is devastating whole counties. The local physicians are not agreed as to the precise nature of the disease. They unite in saying, however, that it is identical with the disease which swept through the New England States a few years ago, killing so many people that it was called "the black death." It appears to be an exceedingly virulent form of cerebro-spinal meningitis, and is accompanied with most remarkable characteristics. None of its victims has survived its attacks, though a few, blind and helpless, are still lingering on the edge of the grave. The first symptom is a chill, then either an increase or decrease of temperature. A malignant type of high fever invariably follows the chill, then prostration and then death—all in the course of a few hours. When the illness has lasted two or three days, there is general prostration. The joints become very sensitive and any slight movement causes great pain. The disease is frequently complicated with arthritis, pneumonia or hydrocephalus. The disease is mainly confined to women and children, and so far as known not a single negro has been attacked. The blindness that results from the disease is a most terrifying feature to the simple country people.

The *News and Courier* speaks as follows of the untimely death of its lamented chief:

Dead! Dead! The man who moved among us yesterday in the flush of health, in the full vigor of manhood, performing with rare ability and conscientious devotion all the private and public duties of a citizen, is dead. Snatched away from the country in which he was no mean figure, from the State which he had served so well, from the city to whose fortunes his life was given, from the family of which he was the worthy idol, Capt. Dawson is no more.

Of the pitiful manner of his taking off, this is not the place to speak. It is enough to know that he is gone.

Let the ex-Confederate bare his head and bow in reverence. A battle-scarred veteran has crossed the river and rests in the shade of the trees.

Let the American patriot mourn, for eyes that looked toward the glory of the future are closed, the stout heart that trod with pride in the new and growing nation has ceased to beat, the strong arms ready to defend its rights are folded in death.

Let South Carolina mourn—the fountain which for twenty years was the source of some of her best impulses and highest achievements has been dried up.

Charleston's loss no words can express. A household word associated with every public movement and well-known every private enterprise has lost its meaning. Not a man or woman, black or white, scarcely a child within the limits of this city, who heard the terrible news last night, asked "Who is he?" They knew too well. The shock was as if a near relative or friend had been stricken down.

Great as is the loss to the city at large, how much more terrible to his relatives and friends! The former are limited to his immediate family. Their grief is sacred. Of the latter there are many. Known of all men, and yet truly known only to his friends—they only can fully appreciate his loss. It is measured only by the worth of the man.

Of one topic, ever present and often uppermost in the mind of him of whom we write, we have said nothing, and yet no notice of Capt. Dawson would be complete without mention of the *News and Courier*, which he created and which he proudly spoke of as his life's work. To make it a monument worthy of him is the highest tribute which his collaborators can pay to his memory.
