

The latest news is that the Russian loan, which was to have been floated next week, has been indefinitely postponed. This shows at once how ugly the financial position really is, as full arrangements had been made to bring out the loan. London stocks seem more demoralized than for a Record. long time past, and it is generally believed that the market is being manipulated to suit the New York bear party. The short interest is enormous, and any attempt to cover would send prices up rapidly.

Mr. Munemitsu Mutsu, the Japan ese minister at Washington, has distributed translations of the Constitution of the Empire of Japan, recently promulgated, together with the imperial speech of promulgation, the imperial ordinance con cerning the House of Peers, the law of the House of Peers and Representatives, the law of election for the members of the House of Representatives, and the law of finance. The Constitution occupies fourteen octavo pages of small pica type, and is in seventy-six articles. The law for the convocation, organization and opening of the Imperial Diet provides that the President and Vice President of the House of Representatives shall be selected by the Emperor from among three candidates elected by the Representatives for each position. The President of the Peers and the Representatives are each to receive about \$4,000 per annum, and the Vice Presidents \$2,000 per year each. Members of both houses are to receive 800 yen per year and an annual allowance for traveling expenses, if they comply with the summons after election. Neither Presidents, Vice Presidents, bers who are in Government service are not to receive an annual allowance. The chairman of the commit tee of the whole House is to be elected for an entire session. Sessions may be held with closed doors upon not less than ten members, or upon the demand of the Government. Government bills may be brought in in either house. No unlimited leaves of absence are allowed to be granted to members, and for overstaying a leave of absence a member may be suspended.


