**Postponement.**

Hicks, from the Fourth. The Republicans are Elijah Lane, from the First, and Thomas J. Lossin and George Bell from the Fifth.

Mr. Kuhlblank received to day the promised car load of bock beer and it will be distributed to-morrow. We have sampled it, and it is good. Bock beer is sent out only in the Spring. It is better and stronger than the ordinary lager beer and costs one third more. Usually beer is sent out about thirty days after it is made, but bock is kept a whole year before it is allowed to leave the brewery. Notwithstanding the additional cost it is furnished to regular customers at the usual price for lager beer.

**The Vote on Subscription.**  
The bill to encourage manufacturers by exempting new industries from taxation for a term of ten years, was carried by popular vote at the election yesterday, receiving 1,822 of the 2,307 votes registered. The vote in detail was as follows:

First Ward—Registered vote, 830; for subscription, 668.  
Second Ward—Registered vote, 299; for subscription, 236.  
Third Ward—Registered vote, 349; for subscription, 276.  
Fourth Ward—Registered vote, 311; for subscription, 243.  
Fifth Ward—Registered vote, 518; for subscription, 412.

Total registered vote, 2,307; total vote for subscription, 1,822.

**Board of Audit and Finance.**  
The newly appointed members of the Board of Audit and Finance met yesterday at the City Hall—Messrs. Jno. F. Mauder from the First Ward, Mr. Wm. Calder from the Second, Mr. R. J. Jones from the Third, Capt. W. R. Kenan from the Fourth and Mr. Jno. W. Hewitt from the Fifth. The oath of office was administered to each member by James W. King, J. P.

On motion of Mr. Jones the meeting was organized by calling Mr. Calder to the chair.

On taking the chair Mr. Calder said the business before the meeting was, first, the election of a permanent chairman and, second, the election of a clerk.

Capt. Kenan nominated Mr. R. J. Jones for chairman. No other nomination was made and Mr. Jones was elected chairman.

Mr. Calder resigned the chair to Mr. Jones, who nominated Capt. John Cowan for clerk. A ballot was taken and Capt. Cowan was declared elected unanimously.

On motion, the Board adjourned to meet again on Monday, April 1st, at 3 p. m.

## MAYOR AND ALDERMEN.

**Election of Officers—John J. Fowler Again Chosen Mayor.**

The election of Aldermen yesterday was supplemented to day, as everybody predicted that it would be, by the reelection of Hon. John J. Fowler as Mayor of Wilmington for the two years next ensuing.

The newly elected Board of Aldermen assembled in caucus at 10 o'clock this forenoon and sat with closed doors, so that reporters had no knowledge of what transpired therein further than as developed by the result.

The meeting for the election of Mayor and the organization of the Board, was announced to be held in the City Court room at noon, but the Aldermen did not complete their preliminary arrangements to enable them to appear until 12.25 p. m. By this time quite a throng of interested and curious spectators were assembled anxious, with the true American spirit, to hear the result.

At the hour named above the newly elected Board of Aldermen entered the room and took their seats around the table, inside the railing, in front of the desk. Of course Mayor Fowler, by virtue of his office, took the chair. The certificates of election were read by W. A. Willson, city clerk, at the conclusion of which, John Cowan, J. P., administered the oath to the Board.

A temporary organization was then effected by calling Alderman J. D. Smith, of the Second Ward, to the chair.

Alderman Smith then declared that the next business before the meeting was the election of a mayor.

Alderman Hicks, of the Fourth Ward, nominated the present incumbent, Hon. John J. Fowler, and was seconded by Alderman Pearsall, of the Second Ward. No other nominations were made.

Aldermen Morton, of the First Ward, and Lossin, of the Fifth Ward, were requested to act as tellers.

The vote resulted as follows: Fowler, 7; blank, 3, and the former was declared elected Mayor of Wilmington for the next two years.

Mayor Fowler then took the chair made vacant for him by Alderman Smith, and acknowledged his thanks for the honor conferred upon him in a few appropriate and graceful remarks, after which the oath of office as Mayor of Wilmington was administered to him by Mr. John Cowan, J. P.

**CLERK AND TREASURER.**  
The newly qualified Mayor then proceeded at once to the completion of the business which had called them together, by announcing that the next thing in order was to elect a City Clerk and Treasurer, and called for nominations, at the same time naming Aldermen Morton and Lane as tellers.

Aldermen Hicks, in a few well chosen remarks named Mr. William A. Willson, the present incumbent, for that position. The nomination was seconded by Alderman Post. No other name was put in nomination and when a ballot was taken 10 votes were cast for Wm. A. Willson, and he was declared elected.

**CHIEF OF POLICE.**  
The selection of Chief of Police was next in order, and Alderman Hicks nominated the present incumbent, Col. E. D. Hall. The nomination was seconded by Alderman Craft.

Alderman Lane put W. S. Hewlett in nomination.

A vote was taken with the following result: Hall, 7; Hewlett, 2; blank 1.

**STREETS AND WHARVES.**  
Alderman Pearsall nominated the present incumbent, Mr. W. H. Sholar, for Superintendent of Streets and Wharves, and Alderman Lossin nominated Mr. John Haar for the same position. A ballot being taken Mr. Sholar received 9 votes and Mr. Haar 1 vote, and the former was declared elected.

**CITY ATTORNEY.**  
Alderman Pearsall put the name of the present incumbent, Mr. DuBrutz Cutler, in nomination for the position of City Attorney. There was no other nomination and a vote was taken, with the following result: Cutler, 7, blank, 2; not voting 1.

Alderman Post moved that the rules of order governing the last Board be adopted by the present Board. This motion elicited some discussion, as there were several of
