Indications.
For North Carolina, fair weather and slightly cooler.

There is some talk of lowering the grade of Chestnut and Second streets in the vicinity of the Postoffice and a survey has been in progress there to day, probably with this end in view.

Dr. E. Porter, of Rocky Point, who is one of the most successful truckers in this section, was here yesterday. He tells us that everything is growing finely and that he expects to ship strawberries by the 15th.

Shad are still running well and the catch continues good. The season will continue several weeks yet but will be on the wane after the 15th. They are being caught in Northern waters and this has served to depress the market there.

The Excursion Season.
The excursion season may be said to have already begun. It is inaugurated by the Seacoast Railroad which to day puts on three trains each way, leaving here at 7:35 a. m. 3 p. m. and 6 p. m. and the Hummocks on the return at 8:10 a. m. 5:15 p. m. and 8 p. m. This last train is seasonal and convenient for business men as they can run down after business hours for a breath of salt air and get back in time for supper.

Postponed Until Monday.
Dr. Wood received a telegram this morning stating that the physicians who are going South to Florida from Washington City had again postponed their visit, and this time until Monday next. The telegram urged Dr. Wood to get ready and accompany them but this he says will be impossible, as he would not be able to get back in time to attend the Medical Convention at Elizabeth City on the 16th. We now fear that the medicals will not stop over in Wilmington.

Welcome to Wilmington.
Dr. W. T. Ennett, of Burgaw, will remove to this city for the practise of his profession. As preparatory to this he has tendered his resignation to the County Commissioners as Superintendent of Health for Pender county. His many friends there will part with him with great regret. But their loss is our gain. We welcome him to Wilmington, not only as a cultured gentleman and an experienced and skillful physician, but as Major of the immortal Third North Carolina Infantry in those dark days which tried all of our souls so sadly.

His Last Resting Place.
The remains of the late Jeff D. Beery were reverently laid away to rest yesterday afternoon in Oakdale Cemetery. The funeral services took place at Grace Church, and were conducted by Rev. Messrs. Creasy and Swindell. There were delegates present in attendance from the Young Men's Christian Association, Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Co. No. 1 and the old Seaside Base Ball Club, of which organizations Mr. Beery was a member. The floral tributes were very beautiful. The pall bearers were Messrs. J. T. Riley, B. G. Empie, A. M. Waddell, Jr., Joseph D. Smith, Aubrey Walsh, W. N. Jacobs, J. D. Kelley and Charles Fore.

Lecture at Burgaw.
A correspondent at Burgaw writes us: "Burgaw had the pleasure of having last night, from Jas. S. Lucas, Esq., an attorney of this place, the most profound and philosophical answer to 'Modern Skepticism' which we believe has been uttered in this century. The lecture was replete with humour, satire and was bright with all the flowers of brilliant rhetoric. But it was the chapter of roses upon the column of marble. For underlying all the play of fancy was the solid strata of philosophical thought, and especially of the law of evidence was there a most able exposition. The brightness was but the flashing of the logical scimitar. We shall hear this great lecturer again shortly in a laughable lecture upon 'Texas and Texans.'"

A Bad Runaway.
The horse attached to the vehicle of the U. S. Marine Hospital in this city ran away this morning and caused a lot of damages. In crossing the street car track at the corner of Fifth and Princess street he started to run and when the driver pulled him in the bit broke. He dashed down Fifth street and threw Dr. Disney, the steward at the Hospital, out as well as the driver. Neither were seriously injured although Dr. Disney was painfully cut and bruised. The maddened animal then dashed on and succeeded in getting rid of the vehicle and finally brought up on South Front street where he turned a complete somersault over one dray and brought up against another. He got some pretty severe cuts and bruises but no bones were broken. Dr. Carmichael, the surgeon in charge, examined and dressed up the cuts and thinks he will be all right after awhile. He is a fine animal, but a spirited one.

North American Review.
The North American Review for April is particularly noteworthy for the timely character of its principal articles. Colonel Ingersoll takes up the question of Agnosticism. Senator Chase, of Rhode Island, who has just resigned, discusses Congressional salaries, and contends that Senators and Representatives are sadly underpaid. Another political topic of uppermost interest at present—the question of the surplus and of an extra session of Congress to revise the tariff—is ably handled by Senator Allison, of Iowa. The symposium in this number relates to the prevention of collisions at sea, which is the chief subject to be considered at the approaching International Marine Conference. Dion Boucault tells the story of the writing and production of his first play, "London Assurance." The ever interesting history of Josephine furnishes a theme for Gail Hamilton's trenchant pen. The Rev. Dr. Abbott points out the differences between the underlying principles and methods of Christianity and those of Socialism. The difficulties in the way of Americans who wish to marry when in foreign countries are set forth in a scholarly paper by the Hon. Eugene Schuyler. Yan Phou Lee, who was recently graduated from Yale College, makes a strong plea in behalf of the Chinese in America, and Mr. George Haven Putnam tells of the advantages that would result from International Copyright. An interesting chapter in reference to the assassination of Lincoln, with inside facts regarding Booth, Mrs. Surratt, and others, is narrated by John T. Ford, formerly proprietor of Ford's Theatre, in which the martyred President was shot. Dr. W. S. Searle describes many of the idiosyncrasies of alcohol, and some entertaining speculations, in reference to the probability of navigating the air, are furnished by Karl Blind. In the department of Nates and Comments, "Thought Transference," "Count Tolstoi and His Critics," "Some Newly Discovered Heroes," and "Geographical Delusions" are among the topics discussed.

Mr. R. C. Johnson, member of the House of Representatives from Pender county, was in the city to-day.

Magistrate's Court.
Mr. D. D. Cameron was before Justice Henry Hall to day, charged with disorderly conduct, on an affidavit made by W. F. Brown, colored. He was declared guilty but judgment was suspended on the payment of costs. Mr. Cameron declined to pay these and took an appeal to the Criminal Court. Mr. Cameron's offense, it seems, consisted in the use of the word "damn," in a private remark addressed to one or two friends in his store. This trial was an outcome of one before the Mayor yesterday, wherein Brown was fined \$20 for disorderly conduct.

Depots on the C. F. & Y. V. Extension.
The Clinton Caucasian says that President Gray was in Sampson last week locating the depots on the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Extension. There will be eleven between Fayetteville and Wilmington. Starting from Fayetteville there will be one about half way between that place and Autry's, a distance of fourteen miles. The next eight miles to near Owenville; three miles to Hives; six and a half miles to Parker's; four miles to Murphy's; five miles to John Kerr's; five miles to Hampton; ten miles to Moore's Creek; ten miles to Long Creek; and eleven miles to Wilmington. This gives Sampson nine of the eleven depots.

City Court.
The Mayor disposed of the following cases this morning:
Wm. Larkins, charged with disorderly conduct, was found guilty and fined \$10 or 20 days.
Maggie Freeman and Lucy Telfair, two small colored girls, were up for fighting but judgment was suspended in these cases on condition that their parents give them a good whipping.
