



Mr. McAllister was originally from the State of Georgia, where his grandfather was Chief Justice and his father Judge of the Circuit Court of the United States. Before the war he was a leader in the old and exclusive society of Newport, R. I. His friends say he never set up the claim that there are only four hun dred people in society in New York. What he did say, according to his defenders, was in answer to the question "How many persons can you count on to come to a swell bull?" He answered four hundred Then a list was made out and he revised it. From this, it is said, came the celebrated story of the four hundred, upon which the New York press has been ringing the changes for a long while.

As already stated the Atlanta Constitution has opened a subscription with the view of raising \$50,000 to found a home for the needy and disabled Confederate soldiers of that State. About \$10,000 was subscribed within twenty-four hours after the opening of the subscription lists, of which Mr. George T. G. White, of New York, contributed \$1,000. It is expected to secure the desired \$50,-000 within ten days, after which it is proposed to build a model home with, perhaps, three thousand acres of land, with an allowance of ten acres and a cottage for every dependent Confederate and his family. The Constitution has received telegrams from editors in almost every town and city in Georgia favoring the establishment of a home and pledging their help. The Constitution takes the ground that the efforts now being made in the North to secure funds to build a Confederate home should be abandoned and that each State should at once inaugurate measures for caring for its disabled and needy Confederate veterans. Governor Gordon has en dorsed the movement in an earnest appeal to his old soldiers to do all in their power for the relief of their destitute fellow soldiers. Generous responses are coming in every day.
