The street car lines of Atlanta are to be consolidated under one management. A syndicate has just bought up the stock of the various lines for \$425,000 and now they will all be operated by the same company.

As already stated the Atlanta Constitution has opened a subscription with the view of raising \$50,000 to found a home for the needy and disabled Confederate soldiers of that State. About \$10,000 was subscribed within twenty-four hours after the opening of the subscription lists, of which Mr. George T. G. White, of New York, contributed \$1,000. It is expected to secure the desired \$50,000 within ten days, after which it is proposed to build a model home with, perhaps, three thousand acres of land, with an allowance of ten acres and a cottage for every dependent Confederate and his family.
