Here is an item of considerable interest to newspaper men. We extract it from the *Herald*:

ARKANSAS CITY, Kan., April 23.—One of the most interesting incidents of the opening of Oklahoma occurred upon the return to Arkansas City this afternoon of the train carrying newspaper correspondents. Seven of the Chicago and other Western correspondents had pooled their issues and engaged a cowboy to meet them on horseback just after the train entered the yards at Arkansas City and to gallop furiously to the telegraph offices. Mr. James Cox, of the *St. Louis Globe-Democrat*, was shut out of the combination.

The plan worked beautifully until the cowboy had galloped half a block on his way to the telegraph office. Then Mr. Cox saw the scheme, and leaping from the moving train he started on foot after the horseman. It was a run of more than a mile to the telegraph office. By a spur Mr. Cox overtook the horse and then a desperate race began. The cowboy lashed his horse vigorously, but he could not shake off the fleet footed correspondent.

On the last eighth of a mile Mr. Cox spurred like a sprinter, and by a terrific effort reached the telegraph office forty rods ahead. When he entered the office he could hardly stand or see. His exploit was the talk of the town to night. The cowboy has not since been seen.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in called session at the City Hall last night to consider a reduction of estimates for appropriations for the current year. All the members of the Board were present, and Mayor Fowler presided. The Mayor stated the object of the meeting, and on motion the rules were suspended and the Board went into Committee of the Whole to consider the matter. The Mayor stated that it would be necessary to take up appropriations made for each department in their regular order for revision and reduction.

A communication from the Board of Audit and Finance was read by the clerk as follows:
 To the Board of Aldermen of the City of Wilmington, N. C.:

GENTLEMEN—The estimates made by your Board to meet the necessary expenditures for the several departments of the city government for the current fiscal year have been received and submitted to the Board of Audit and Finance for their concurrence, and after a careful estimate of the same, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Chairman of this Board be requested to return to the Board of Aldermen their estimates of expenditures for the next year, with a detailed statement of the fixed expenditures of the city and an estimate of our expected income, including an increased levy of twenty five cents on real and personal property to meet interest on railroad bonds, with the request that they revise their estimates or devise ways and means to meet them.

Under the above resolution I herewith submit an estimate of the expected income of the city for the city for the current fiscal year, which is based upon the last year's report of the city treasurer. From all sources..... \$128,260.06 To which add an increase of 25 cents on real estate and personal, estimated to produce..... 13,500.00

Estimated income of the city for fiscal year..... \$131,700.06
 The fixed expenditures of the city are:
 Interest on bonded debt..... \$34,320.00
 Do. on railroad bonds (estimated)..... 7,500.00
 Interest on loans..... 2,500.00
 Sinking fund..... 2,000.00
 Bonds due in July..... 5,500.00
 Old bonds not yet presented for payment..... 5,000.00
 Floating debt..... 14,600.00
 Total amount of fixed expenses \$71,420.00; leaving for current expenses only \$70,280.06, while the grand total for current expenses foots up \$103,246.40.

You can readily see the necessity for our action in asking for a revision of the estimates before us. Very Respectfully,

After prolonged discussion over almost every item of the appropriations—the session continuing from 8 o'clock until 11—reductions in appropriations were agreed upon as follows: Light department, \$378; markets, \$550; water works, \$1,000; permanent improvement of streets, \$6,475. Making a total reduction of \$8,403.

The appropriation for streets and wharves was increased by adding \$150, required for feeding two horses omitted in the original estimate.

A motion, submitted by Alderman Pearsall was adopted, that the Board of Audit and Finance be informed that all the reductions deemed possible had been made, and that if other reductions are necessary that a joint meeting of the two boards be held to consider the matter.

The Board then went into an election for alderman from the Fifth Ward to supply the vacancy caused by the resignation of Alderman Lossin, and Mr. J. A. Montgomery was elected.

Dr. Pritchard pronounced the words that made them man and wife. There were many handsome presents. The ushers were Messrs. D. D. Cameron, Ed. Hewlett, G. C. Hewlett and John Smith. A reception was held after the ceremony. Mr. Orrell will take his bride down to her new home at Masonboro to-morrow.

A Derelict at Sea.
 The signal office at Southport reports as follows: Capt. C. A. Pletsch, of the German barque *Marianne Bertha*, reports passing on April 24th at 4 p. m., in latitude 32:10 north and longitude 77:20 west, the American schooner *Alis Borda*, of Camden, N. J., water logged, mizenmast gone and mainmast in a falling condition. It is presumed that the schooner had been abandoned, although the report does not say so.

The same barque also spoke, March 30th, latitude 20:28, longitude 30:13, ship *E. V. C.*, steering North, from Valparaiso for Hull. All well on board.

Also, on March 28th, in latitude 21:05, longitude 40:48, British barque *L. R. E. V.*, steering N. N. E., from San Francisco for Liverpool.
