Prohibition will not have a chance to prohibit in Massachusetts this year. Full returns are now in from the recent elections and they show a total vote for the amendment of 88,696 and against it of 133,195. Majority against, 44,499.

The Thingvalla line will pay for that part of the cargo of the *Misouri* which was jettisoned. A dispatch from Philadelphia says:

Messrs. Funch, Elye & Co., of New York, agents of the Thingvalla line of steamers, to which company the lost *Denmark* belonged, telegraphed to day to this city that they have received a cable from Copenhagen directing them to pay the owners of the Atlantic transport steamer *Missouri* for the cargo which the last named steamer jettisoned, for the purpose of making room to accommodate the *Denmark's* passengers.

The biggest dry dock in America is that which was opened yesterday at Newport News, Va. A dispatch from Fortress Monroe says:

In the presence of about eighty representative business men of New York and a respectable sprinkling of naval officers and newspaper men of Washington, the new dry dock of the Chesapeake Dry Dock and Construction Company was formally opened at Newport News to day, when the monitor *Puritan* was docketed. The dock is the largest by far in the United States, the dimensions being as follows: Length at top, 600 feet; width at top, 130 feet; bottom, 50 feet; with entrance, 93 feet; draft of water over sill, 25 feet; capacity, 8,500,000 gallons. The dock was built in two years by Simpson & Co., being the fourteenth they have constructed.

St. Louis is happy at last. It has a big gas trust. Just how the thing was worked is told in the following special from that city:

"The New York and Philadelphia syndicate which stole into St. Louis about three weeks ago and paid \$3,500,000 for the Laclede Gas Works, has just distinguished itself by capturing the other gas companies at a nominal cost of \$5,500,000, making the total investment in St. Louis at \$9,000,000 in less than a week. The agents were supposed to be acting for the Vanderbilts and August Belmont. When, however, James O'Connor and W. W. Gibbs appeared upon the scene it became evident that the Equitable and United Gas Company, of New York and Philadelphia, in other words, Rockefeller, Warden, Gibbs, and other Standard Oil millionaires, were back of the purchase.

In accordance with the usual formula the gas companies of the city will be consolidated, an immense trust formed, and \$10,000,000 of bonds, and \$2,500,000 of preferred stock issued, the syndicate thus coming into control of several plants without the expenditure actually of a cent."

Spare the Birds' Nests.

A good friend of ours, resident in this city, in a communication to the REVIEW voices the sentiment which has frequently occurred to us. It is in regard to the wholesale destruction by boys of the birds' nests, in the eager and thoughtless search for eggs, with which to make up a collection. He says: Will you not, through the columns of your valuable paper, make an appeal to the young boys and their parents in behalf of the poor little birds of our forest? It is not generally known what sad havoc is made upon our sweet songsters daily, and especially on Saturdays, by at least one-third of the younger population of our city. For miles the woods are scoured in search of birds' nests, each boy getting up a collection. You can find the eggs of almost every bird in our forests in some of them. 'Tis wrong, 'tis cruel. We are deprived of their sweet songs and the farmers of their valuable services in destroying worms and other insects so destructive on our truck farms. When I was a boy it was considered a disgrace to rob a bird's nest.

If the boys would but confine their depredations to the nest of the English sparrow now domiciled here which are breeding now rapidly and are becoming a real nuisance, the evil would not be so great. But when they rob the nests of the mocking-birds, the thrush and the red bird, they are threatening the extermination of some of the most beautiful and valuable denizens of the woods. We see no way of remedying the evil but through parental influence and the discouraging by all of collections of birds' eggs.

Joint Centennial Services. Joint services of the several Episcopal churches will be held at St. James' Church on Tuesday morning next, at 9 o'clock. The service will be that used by Bishop Provoost on the morning of April 30th, 1789, at which General Washington, his Cabinet and the members of Congress were present. Leaflets containing the service will be provided. The sermon on the occasion will be delivered by Rev. Mr. Arnold, of St. Paul's.

The Lutheran Church Next Tuesday. On next Tuesday, April 30th, services will be held in St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, at 9 o'clock in the morning. The services will be conducted by the pastor, Rev. F. W. E.
