## LOCAL NEWS.

City Court.

The following cases were disposed of by the Mayor this morning:

Elisha Smith, disorderly conduct, \$5 and costs, amounting in all to \$8.15.

Benj. Johnson, for disorderly conduct, was sentenced for the costs.

David Martin, disorderly conduct, \$5 or 10 days.

Rena Pearsal, disorderly conduct; being an old offender she was fined \$20 or 30 days in the county jail.

Marshal Kerman, disorderly conduct, was fined \$5 and costs but judgment was suspended on condition that his parents give him a good whipping.

A Gallant Rescue.

Two lads of this city, Quince, aged about 12 years, and Henry, his brother, about 10 years old, sons of Col. Roger Moore, went out to Quince's Mill, about five miles East of the city on Tuesday last to go fishing. They got into a boat and pushed out into the creek, but in some way the boat was overturned and the boys thrown into the water. Quince is a good swimmer, but Henry is not. The younger lad went down and Quince dived for him twice. The second time he found him in the mud and caught him by the hair and brought him up. He started to swim to the shore with him but finding his strength almost exhausted sang out to a colored man on the bank to push out a pole to him which was done and the two boys safely drawn to land. Quince told his mother afterwards that he made up his mind, as soon as he found himself in the water, that he wasn't going home without Henry. It was a gallant act and the brave little fellow is a veritable chip of the old block.

A Pleasant Item.

The Durham Plant says: "We learn that the congregation of Trinity Methodist Church will tender their beloved pastor, Rev. Dr. E. A. Yates, a vacation this summer and will present him a purse of sufficient calibre to defray his expenses to the World's Sunday School Convention at London. We have no doubt the Dr. will highly appreciate this manifestation of esteem and will greatly enjoy his trip to Europe."

Drowned Near the Dram Tree.

This morning, as the schooner *Argyle* Capt. John Morgan, which runs between this city and Little River, was on her way down the river and when opposite the Dram Tree she went about and the main boom struck one of the deck hands by the name of Isaac Morgan, a colored boy 13 years old, knocking him overboard. The Captain cut the small boat loose thinking the boy would catch it but it didn't reach him. The steamer *Louise* was on her way to the city and seeing the boy go over she started to his rescue, but just as she reached him and the mate, Mr. L. A. Galloway, threw him a rope the boy sank. They think he was stunned when hit, as he did not make any struggle in the water.

A New Arrangement Needed.

The Committee on Lights of the Board of Aldermen have succeeded in arranging for additional electric lights, three in number, to be placed at Eighth and Princess streets, and Third and Castle, and one in "Brooklyn." A gas lamp, also, is to be placed at Tenth and Princess streets.

There is something else needed, and that is a new arrangement of the electric lights. Has any one ever noticed that as a rule these lights are placed in the hollows instead of on the hills? At several important points where a good light is greatly needed there is none at all. Take, for instance, Front and Red Cross streets, near the depot. This is one of the most difficult places in the city to pass after dark and yet there is absolutely no street light, either at the corner of Front street, or Nutt street. Not only the approaches to the Union Depot but the approaches and crossings of the freight yards below, which it is necessary to pass to reach the Carolina Central depot and other points, are left in Cimmerian darkness. Then, too, Third street, North of Walnut. There is nothing but a very insufficient gas light on the street from Red Cross to the railroad track.

The Federal Court.

In this Court yesterday afternoon the libel case of C. P. Moore, vs. the steamer *Della* and owners, for wages claimed to be due and amounting to \$164, was argued by M. Bellamy, Esq., for libellant and Junius Davis, Esq., for respondent. Judge Seymour took the papers in this case also.

In the case of Richard Harrell, of Robeson county, convicted of violation of revenue laws, judgment was suspended on payment of costs—\$68.81.

All other cases on the docket were continued and the Court adjourned for the term.

On the adjournment of the District Court the Circuit Court was convened, with His Honor, Judge Seymour, presiding, when the following cases were disposed of:

The New Jersey and North Carolina Land and Lumber Company vs. Henry C. Long, of Brunswick; action for recovery of land. Plaintiff submitted to a judgment of non-suit. Messrs. Russell & Ricard counsel for plaintiffs, and Messrs. C. M. Steadman, Fuller & Snow and John D. Bellamy, Jr., counsel for defendant.

The same judgment was entered in a case in which this land company was plaintiff and A. T. Clark, Dugald Clark and C. F. Clark were defendants. Also, same plaintiffs vs. Samuel Clews, Henry Smith and Asbury Little.

James A. Schulken, of Whiteville, Columbus county, was appointed Commissioner of the Circuit Court.
