STATE NEWS.

Charlotte Democrat: Sharon Presbyterian Church, this county, has made a contract with a builder to erect a new brick church at a cost of \$4,000. — Mr. Joe Baruch leaves Charlotte next Wednesday for Europe. Mr. Baruch will visit England, France, Belgium, Germany, Austria, Italy and Switzerland. He will probably extend his trip into other countries.

Charlotte News: Machinists are busily engaged at the Alpha factory in filling the remaining floor space with machinery. Machinery is on hand now to entirely fill the factory, and 5,000 Alpha spindles will be in operation in a short time. — The committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to solicit subscriptions for the proposed Lutheran Seminary in Charlotte has secured subscriptions amounting to \$6,500. The sum of \$10,000 is all that is asked of Charlotte to secure the \$50,000 seminary.

Raleigh News and Observer: Mr. Vanderbilt, the New York millionaire, continues to increase the size of his magnificent property near Asheville. His latest purchase is a tract of 600 acres, known as the P. F. Patton Swannanoa farm, for which he paid \$87,000. — The meeting of subscribers in the cotton factory was held last night at the rooms of the Y. M. C. A. There were thirty or more of Raleigh's substantial and moneyed business men present and there was a decided present atmosphere pervading the gathering. Mr. N. B. Broughton was made chairman and Mr. E. G. Harrell secretary. The committee reported that \$50,000 had been subscribed, and in a few minutes this amount was swelled to \$60,000.

Fayetteville Observer: Who says Fayetteville is not coming out of the kinks? Two flat cars were built at the C. F. & Y. V. shops here last week in one day between the hours of 11 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m. — The C. F. & Y. V. shops here are constantly adding to their rolling stock and have just completed 25 new flat cars and have in course of construction 25 new box cars. Besides this they have just overhauled and painted 4 passenger cars. — Julius A. Gray, President of the C. F. & Y. V. Railroad Company, has very generously tendered the use of his private car to the committee for the transportation of ex-President Jefferson Davis and family to and from the celebration here in November, and the committee will listen to nothing short of Mr. Davis' acceptance of the invitation to be orator of the day.

Monroe Enquirer: On last Monday Mr. Harrison Honeycutt, of Stanly county, was bitten by a horse which was supposed to have the hydrophobia. On Monday morning Mr. Honeycutt noticed that the horse appeared to be sick, and instead of putting him to work as usual, turned him loose in the pasture. About 11 o'clock Mr. H. went to catch the horse, and while attempting to bribe him, the horse became vicious and bit him, inflicting a painful wound. Help was summoned and, after considerable difficulty, the horse was gotten into the stable. By this time the horse seemed perfectly wild, and attempted to bite everything that came within his reach. He continued to show very decided symptoms of hydrophobia, biting at the walls of the stable. It soon became evident that he could not long be kept confined, and he was killed. It is not known whether he had been bitten by a mad dog or not.

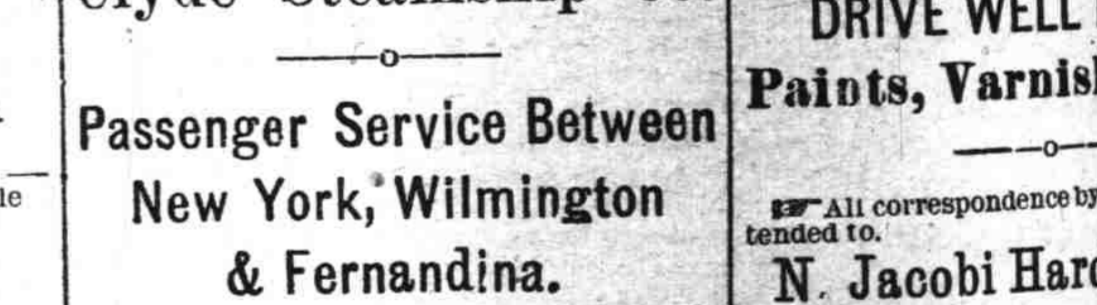
