Decoration Day.
The day passed off almost entirely unobserved, save the exercises at the National Cemetery. At about 3 o'clock the organizations and private citizens who were to take part in the ceremonies, began to gather at the City Hall, and at 4 o'clock the procession, headed by the Enterprise Cornet Band, moved down Third street and into Market on the route to the cemetery, where an oration was delivered by Rev. J. S. Brown, after which the decoration of the graves took place.

Firemen's Excursion.
The excursion given this afternoon on the steamer *Sylvan Grove* to Carolina Beach, given by the Chief of the Fire Department, Mr. M. Newman, to the officers and members of the W. S. F. E. Co. No. 1, and the officers of the other white fire companies and Dennis Board of Aldermen, was well patronized. The boat left her wharf at 3 o'clock. We hope our gallant firemen will have a nice time. They were accompanied by Mayor Fowler and the ex-Chief of the Fire Department, Mr. John G. Oldenbutter.

Death of an Old Colored Fireman.
Parish Jones, colored, died at his residence, on Eighth, between Ann and Nun streets, this morning about 5 o'clock, in his 64th year. He had been chief engineer of the fire steamer Cape Fear for the past fifteen years, and was always at his post whenever his services were required. He will be buried to-morrow from St. Luke's Church and all of the colored fire companies will follow his remains to their last resting place.

What Has Become of the Exodus?
MR. EDITOR:—A few weeks ago our sable hued citizens were much exercised on this subject and large gatherings were held with a view to rousing an interest in a movement which, if successfully planned and executed, might have benefited this city immensely by relieving us of the drones of that race which are constantly leaving the country where their labor is in demand and flocking here to live in idleness and on their wits in a city. The writer predicted then that nothing would come of this much boasted exodus. History since the beginning records but one successful exodus of a whole people and it took 40 years to accomplish it then, how could the negroes expect to be more highly favored than the Israelites. A race without an ancestry, which harbors no malice and is incapable of entertaining the finest quality of the human heart gratitude is not fitted to found an empire, to lead any great movement or to establish themselves in a community, whether that community be one of the sisterhood of States or a single county or village. It is plainly apparent to even a casual observer that those who expected relief from this seven days wonder are doomed to bitter disappointment.

Then, too, those who had hoped to see a white immigration take the place of the present negro labor will look in vain for such a substitution so devoutly to be wished.

Some portions of this State have been more fortunate in this particular, but notwithstanding all the brass band notoriety beralding this great movement, we are informed that not two thousand tickets have been sold to exodusters by all the railroads of the State. And there are not a few who predict that those who have inaugurated this grand movement have written in terms not calculated to tempt the negro from here.
