A prolonged shock of earthquake was felt on the islands in the English Channel yesterday.

Allen Thorndike Rice gave \$3,000 for the *North American Review*. It now pays a net profit of \$30,000 a year, and he refused \$300,000 for it shortly before his death.

Wilson B. Scott, of Deposit, N. Y., lost his life in a very singular manner Wednesday morning. He was a prominent merchant and creamery man and in working about a vat of cream fell into it and was drowned.

The Arkansas Press Association has adopted a resolution deprecating personal journalism and embracing the following clause: "We recommend that this association refuse to exchange with any editor who indulges in personal journalism."

Dr. Jerome Cochran, State Health Officer of Alabama, returned to Montgomery yesterday from a trip to South Florida and Havana. He went to investigate the yellow fever situation. He reports that there has been no yellow fever in Florida since January except one case reported in April at Sanford.

The new law which has just gone into effect in New Jersey forbidding any person to marry minors except in the presence of guardians or parents, or unless a properly authenticated certificate of their consent is presented, will seriously affect the marriage business of Camden and all the other Jersey towns across the Delaware from Pennsylvania.

The father of Hugh Mottram Brooks, alias Maxwell, who was hanged at St. Louis last summer for the murder of Charles Arthur Preller, clings with pitiful persistence to the belief that his boy was innocent. The foreman of the jury that convicted Brooks recently received a letter from the old gentleman, who lives in England, which is full of bitterness against those whom he styles the murderers of his son.

There is a row in Pittsburg labor circles over a notice given by the Secretary of the National Brotherhood of Carpenters to the effect that any of the members who are attached to the Knights of Labor cannot receive either sick or death benefits. The members of the Knights of Labor think this is the beginning of an open fight for supremacy by the American Federation of Labor against the Knights of Labor.

Storm Notes.  
From the Signal Observer at this port we obtain the following notes: The amount of rainfall since the beginning of the storm at 7:50 o'clock yesterday morning to 3:30 p. m. to-day is .80.

No report of damage in this locality has been received here.

At 8 o'clock this morning the storm was central in Pennsylvania. Rain was general in all States East of the Mississippi River. The largest fall for the 24 hours ending at 8 a. m. to day are reported from Knoxville, Detroit, Lynchburg and Charlotte.

Heavy gales are reported all along the coast. The greatest velocity of the wind was 90 miles per hour yesterday morning and 24 last night. At Southport the highest was 48, at 10 a. m. yesterday, and it continued all day and night and up to 2 p. m. to day at between 36 and 24 miles per hour.

Robberies.  
Some time during last night thieves entered the premises of Mr. Geo. S. Willis, 812 Chestnut street, and robbed his pantry of all the provisions it contained, taking the buckets which had lard and flour in them. After cleaning out the pantry they broke open a window to the kitchen and took a bag of eggs that were on a table near the window. The noise was heard by members of the household, but as a strong wind was blowing at the time, it was supposed to have been caused by a loose window shutter. Mr. Willis had to go shopping this morning before the family got break fast.

The house of Mr. Charles J. Pleasants, who lives on Seventh, between Dock and Orange streets, was broken open and robbed last Wednesday, a gold watch, pistol and other articles being taken. Mr. Pleasants's family are absent from the city, and when he returned home from business at 10 o'clock Wednesday night, he found that the house had been entered and robbed. The back door had been broken open with an axe which was found on the premises.
