**The Public Schools.**  
 The Board of Education met yesterday at the Court House and ratified the action of the school committees of Districts 1 and 2, in appointing Prof. M. C. S. Noble superintendent of the schools in these districts—embracing all the public schools in the city. Mr. Walker Meares, Superintendent of Public Instruction, thereupon tendered his resignation, to take effect immediately. It was accepted, and the Board soon after adjourned.

**Audit and Finance.**  
 The Board of Audit and Finance met yesterday afternoon. Present: Messrs. R. J. Jones, (chairman), Wm. Calder, W. R. Kenan, Jno. W. Hewett.

Two eight per cent. funding bonds for \$1,000 each, and eleven coupons for \$225, which had been redeemed and cancelled, were burned in the presence of the Board. Bills were audited and approved as follows: Current expenses, \$464.12; bonds, \$2,000; coupons, \$255.

**Grand Family Excursion.**

**Off for Europe.**  
 Mr. John C. Davis left here last night for New York, whence he will sail to-morrow on the steamship *Bothnia*, of the Cunard line, for Europe. He goes as a delegate from the State Sunday School Convention to the World's Sunday School Convention, which meets in London on July 2d. The *Bothnia* has been engaged especially for the transportation of the delegates and none but these can sail on her this trip. This will make it delightful for the voyagers. 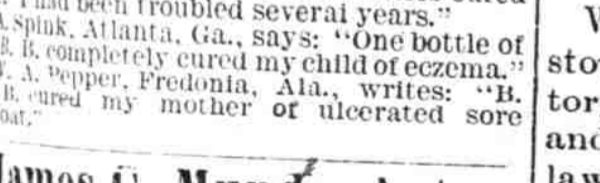
