There were 26 permanent boarders registered at Island Beach Hotel, at the Hammocks, yesterday and this morning. The house is pretty full now (but there is always room for one more, you know,) and increased accommodations are becoming an imperative necessity.

We are glad to know that the Wilmington Anatomists, otherwise known as the "Little Tycoons," will give two performances at the Opera House during the Encampment, for the benefit of the Wilmington Light Infantry. The announcement was made at company drill last night and was hailed with cheers by the boys. "Said Pasha" will be presented.

Capt. B. L. Perry, proprietor of the hotel at Carolina Beach, was in the city to day. He says that there has been a big run lately on pig fish but that he has managed to meet the demand. He has an arrangement whereby the fish can be kept alive for weeks at a time. They are placed in a large tank and supplied with a continuous stream of "fresh salt water" from the sea, conveyed through iron pipes.

Hot and cold water baths are provided in the hotel and the new bath houses in the channel, furnishing pure, clear, healthy salt water, will soon be ready. Mr. Platt, we are glad to hear, proposes to keep the house open during the winter months and expects it to be made the headquarters of sportsmen from the North and West.

The Sylvan Grove carried down large crowds to day to Carolina Beach, the occasion being the picnic given by the Sunday School of St. James' Church. There were about 250 on the first trip.

At 8 o'clock to day the thermometer in this office registered 96 degrees. This was in the window, with the glare upon it. It has been about the warmest day of the season, thus far, but not the most unpleasant. Good breezes have tempered the heat all day long.

A number of gentlemen have approached us on the subject, warmly endorsing the idea, and hoping that it may be carried out. One of these, in conversing with us on the subject this morning, thought that the boatmen might be supported by voluntary contributions placed in boxes erected on the beach for this purpose, but we think that this idea is hardly feasible. Good boatmen, men that could be relied upon in cases of emergency, would hardly care to take the chances of such an arrangement. There is no doubt of a handsome reward whenever the boatmen should prove of benefit in actually preserving life, but this might and probably would prove a rare event. Our friend tells us of an instance at Morehead last Summer where a young lady's life was gallantly preserved by a young man, a stranger to all on the beach. He brought her to shore and was modestly retiring when a very wealthy gentleman, who witnessed the scene, stepped up and tapped him on the shoulder and asked to speak to him. He then led him aside and handed him a sealed envelope, with the request that he would not open it immediately. When the young man did open it afterwards he found enclosed therein \$100, with the request that he would accept it as a testimonial of his gallantry.

In this connection we will state that Mr. R. E. L. Brown, proprietor of the restaurant on Wrightsville Beach, and himself one of the heroes of the late gallant rescue, in commenting on the article in the REVIEW, and endorsing it, stated that he would guarantee the keep of a man provided some arrangement could be made to pay him wages.
