### Confederate Veterans.

Col. Wm. L. DeRosset having been tendered by the Governor the command of the Confederate veterans, on the occasion of the visit of their body to the encampment of the State Guard, which it is expected will take place on Friday, July 13th, has accepted the same and has selected as his personal staff Col. Jno. D. Taylor, Capt. Walter G. MacRae and Capt. Jas. I. Metts, Adjutant.

The command will be divided into six companies, for the more easy handling of the same, and the following gentlemen have been selected to command the several companies: 1st Company, Commander Jos. Price; 2d Company, Capt. Thos. C. Lewis; 3d Company, Maj. T. Hall McKoy; 4th Company, Capt. R. M. McIntire; 5th Company, P. Heinsberger; 6th Company, Capt. W. P. Osham.

### Suspected Infanticide.

A case calling for the intervention of the police was reported at that early in the day a colored woman by the name of Sarah Jones gave birth to an illegitimate child in a shanty near Hilton. Archie Lee, also colored, her paramour and the father of the child, was the only present with her at the time. Soon after its birth he took up the child and started off with it against the protests of the woman. She became alarmed for its safety and got some of the neighbors to report the case. Officers Howland and Wood were detailed and in the midst of the driving rain they proceeded to a rice field about three miles from the city, where they understood that Lee was at work, and succeeded in capturing him. There is no trace of the child and it is feared that Lee has made away with it. The woman was reported as in great destitute, in a miserable shanty, lying on the floor on a bundle of rags. Dr. Potter was notified and she will be properly cared for.

### To Sail for Europe.

A bevy of charming young ladies in this city—Misses Jessie Kenan, Janie Allen, Anna Mebane, Sue Cumming and Emma Chadbourn, chaperoned by Mrs. W. H. Chadbourn, will leave here to-morrow on the steamship Yemassee for New York, from which place they will sail on the steamship, State of Nevada on July 6th for Europe, on the school teachers' excursion. The four intervening days they will spend in New York inspecting some of the wonders of the great metropolis.

### The Mayo House.

### A Consolidation.

It was announced yesterday afternoon that the Wilmington Gas Light Company had purchased the plant and franchise of the North Carolina Power Company—known as the electric light company. A meeting of the stockholders of the Gas Light Company was held yesterday afternoon, at which the bargain was confirmed. The purchase is in effect a consolidation of the two companies, the stockholders in the Power Company being paid for their holdings with stock issued by the Gas Light Company. It is understood that the works of the electric light company will be removed to the Gas Company's yard at the foot of Castle street, and the plants consolidated under one management.

### Two Hundred More Rooms.

The Island Beach Hotel at the Hammocks is full and it is generally kept full. As fast as guests depart others arrive to take their places. The house is becoming very popular. Many of Mr. Platt's guests are gentlemen from this city, with their families, who will spend the Summer there, finding all the delights of a first class Summer resort and yet being at hand to attend to business. There are numbers of guests from other cities in the Southern States. It is painfully apparent now that the hotel building is too small and we understand that it is to be largely added to and improved during the Winter. It is said that 200 rooms are to be built during the Winter and that electric lights and other conveniences are to be added. A gentleman of this city, who is spending the Summer there with his wife, says that there would be a thousand guests there now were there sufficient accommodations for them. This may be somewhat of an extravagant estimate, but it is certainly indicative of the popularity which this house has already attained.

### On to Atlanta.

The Charlotte Observer, comments on the rapidity with which the bonds of the Georgia, Carolina and Northern Railroad, were taken up and they were taken twice over before 1 o'clock and goes on to congratulate the people of Charlotte on this new outlet for them to the Southwest.

The fact is there are more places than one that will derive great benefit from the completion of this road. Wilmington and Atlanta, now widely separated, will become practically next door neighbors, and there will not only be new territory opened to our enterprising business men, but new people to attract to our unequalled seaside resorts.

The Georgia, Carolina and Northern Railroad is built from Monroe, N. C., to Chester, S. C. Its objective point is Atlanta, Georgia. The route of the road will be through or near Anderson, S. C., and through Elberton and Athens, Georgia, and on to Atlanta, where the road will have outlets to the West via Chattanooga, and to the Southwest via Birmingham.
