A New Church Dedicated.
The new Presbyterian Church at Beulahville, Duplin county, was dedicated last Sunday and a correspondent says of this interesting event: "On last Sabbath I had the pleasure of attending the dedicatory services of the Presbyterian Church at Beulahville, (Snatchett,) Duplin county. It is a very neat, commodious building and reflects great credit upon the liberality and taste of the people of that community. The services commenced on Saturday and the congregations were large, both day and night, and on Sunday, notwithstanding the rain and the swollen condition of the streams, there were fully 600 people present. The singing was good, the preaching was good, and the hospitality of the people unbounded and all seemed to enjoy themselves. It will be long remembered in the history of Beulahville. The services were conducted by Rev. J. D. Stanford, under whose ministrations the church there has been organized and the building erected, and Rev. B. F. Marable, D. D. It was Dr. Marable's first visit to the place and he greatly endeared himself to the people and they sincerely hope that at no distant day he may pay them another visit. Rev. J. D. Stanford will hold a protracted meeting there, commencing on the Friday before the second Sunday in August, and the people are looking forward to it as a time when many will be added to the church. I think I can safely say I have never mingled with a more hospitable, generous, kind-hearted people than those around Beulahville."

At a special meeting of the governing board, held yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, the following communication was read, and upon motion of Mr. Norwood Giles, the recommendations therein were unanimously concurred in and the conditions under which the Latimer Cup is sailed for were amended to conform, to wit:
THE LATIMER CUP.
WILMINGTON, June 20, 1889.
"Mr. Wm. Latimer, City:
Feeling assured (by the fact that at two contemplated regattas have already been given up this season, on account of probable non entry of yachts) that the success of this season's regattas of the Carolina Yacht Club demands that some extra inducements and changes in existing sailing regulations be made.
We, the undersigned yacht owners, respectfully request you, as donor of the "Latimer Cup," to ask the governing board of the Carolina Yacht Club to make such changes in the sailing regulations for same, as may give second and third class boats a better showing, and thereby increase their interest; also, if practicable, to offer special prizes for at least one of the classes, in all of the races of this season. We would suggest that satisfactory regulations, in regard to the "Latimer Cup" contests, might be as follows: To allow the yachts of the three classes (provided at least two in each class are entered for a regatta) to sail against those of their class and in case that two or three should win the same three consecutive races in their classes, the cup should belong to that yacht which should first fail to be defeated by any boat of her class in any of the succeeding races. A failure to enter any of the succeeding races to be counted as a defeat.
