to-morrow night at 8 o'clock, which
will last for one week. Mr. Cargile
is said to be efficient in the defence
of the doctrine of adventism, and
that he has engaged in many discus-
sions with scholars and knotty
questions in theology. His knowl-
edge of the scriptures and his pecul-
iar way of delivery are sure to inter-
est those who hear him. Everybody

A Rumpus and Its Results.
A difficulty occurred last evening
at the Encampment between private

one of the prettiest series of military
evolutions we have ever seen.
