About one sixth of the population of New York deserted the city last Sunday and hied themselves to some pleasure resort. According to the Herald just 299,837 people went out of the town on that day.

Governor Buckner recently declined to furnish a copy of the Constitution of Kentucky to be filed with an exhibit at the Paris Exposi tion, because, according to that Constitution, slavery appears to be still existing in the Commonwealth.
