The Greensboro Excursion.

The Methodist Sunday School excursion from Greensboro arrived here yesterday afternoon, at 5 o'clock, via the C. C. R. R. There were six coaches in the train and about 350 people in the party. Some went down at once to the Hammocks, over the Seacoast R. R., but the larger number remained in the city until this morning, when they made a break for the salt water. They were received at the depot by committees from the M. E. Sunday Schools in the city.

The Exodusters.

Geo. W. Price, of this city, one of the Exodus Commissioners, spoke to a large crowd of colored people at Scotland Neck recently. The *Weldon News* reports that he "was canvassing the State to prevent the negroes from being deceived by so-called emigration agents. He would advise all the negroes to remain where they are until the committee could make a report. He said that President Harrison would be asked to use his influence to induce Congress to make an appropriation to aid the negroes to emigrate when once a place was found for them to go."

Down the Sound.

Col. E. S. Latimer, Capt. Jno. H. Daniel, Mr. B. Southerland and Mr. W. M. Powell left the Hammocks yesterday afternoon in the yacht *Vizen* for a few days' sport down the Sound. They carried a tent, and will have some fine sport in fishing and hunting. How far they will go will depend in a large measure on the weather, which at this time gives every indication of being pleasant and suitable. When we say "down the Sound" we mean towards the North; "up the Sound" is toward the head, which is at Carolina Beach. Not everybody understands this and hence this explanation.

A Big Day at the Beach.

This has been a big day at Carolina Beach. The steamer *Sylvan Grove* carried down a very large crowd this morning and a heap more this afternoon. She makes the 5 o'clock trip and the *Passport* goes down at 7 o'clock. The arrangement is that the *Passport* will help to bring back the people to-night, if necessary, but it is probable that the *Grove* will be able to do the work. Many of those who went down in the forenoon were excursionists who will return to the city in time to leave at 7 o'clock this evening. The Germania Band will play at the Beach to-night and this fact will attract many who will go down on the late boat. There will be plenty of room and comfort for all who may go.

We second the Motion.

The *Burgaw Herald* feels assured that there is a handsome profit in stock raising in Pender county. So think we. At least there could be a handsome profit if all the conditions were favorable. The *Herald* says:
We would like to see the subject of stock raising engage the attention of Mr. Gibson James, Mr. Thomas Bradshaw, Mr. E. McMoore, Mr. T. J. Armstrong and some other of our thrifty farmers, who would experiment with the grasses and import better cattle into the county. During the months of April, May and June no country affords better pasturing than can be found on her meadows and piny flats.

Pender county could raise ten thousand sheep, to profit and advantage, but for the dogs, bipeds as well as quadrupeds. We know that a great many sheep are killed by the dogs and we know that a great many are laid to their charge which they do not kill. Get rid of the four legged animals, however, and the two legged animals will not be so adventurous. Mr. Gibson James, alluded to in the *Herald*, has some six or eight thousand acres of land in the upper part of Pender county which he tried a few years ago to utilize in sheep farming. He had at one time several hundred fine sheep but the dogs got in among them and killed them out until there were not enough left for breeding purposes. If we ever get a legislature plucky enough to pass a law for the protection of sheep husbandry then Pender county will surely come to the front in this industry. In the meantime, we suggest that her people go in for the production of hay on their fine meadow lands. There's money in that, also.
