STATE NEWS.

Chatham Record: The western corn planted in this county is growing much better than was reported, a few weeks ago, and that it will make a better crop than was then expected. — A protracted meeting was held last week at Mt. Pleasant Church, in Baldwin township, at which quite a large number of conversions were made.

Reidsville Review: The continuous fall of rain last week caused the largest freshet of the Dan river ever known to the oldest inhabitants. Some say that it was from three to four feet higher than ever known. The crops in the low grounds are all probably ruined, in a great many places the water being over the tops of the corn and in some places the tassels could only be seen above water.

Rockingham Rocket: The County Commissioners have issued and disposed of \$12,000 of Richmond county bonds, the money to be used in the construction and furnishing of the new court house.

Ludwell, of the Salvation Army. — Since July 25th rain has fallen every day until yesterday and the prospects seemed very good for more in the morning, but about noon the sky cleared off, the sun came out, and there was every indication that the long spell of wet weather was over. According to the records at the signal office, ten and three quarter inches of rain fell in this time, which is at the rate of nearly an inch per day.

Heny Marsh, who works at the furniture factory of Elliott & Marsh, and who is a son of the latter, was seriously stabbed just below the heart, Monday night, about eleven o'clock. Dr. Wilder was summoned to attend the wounded man, who was at Mr. Campian's where he boards. Dr. Wilder found the wound to be a deep one, but Mr. Marsh refused to let him probe it. The man bled profusely. Tuesday and yesterday, he was in a precarious condition; and it was only last night that the doctor thought him well enough to be removed to the house of his father. Mr. Marsh says he was assaulted in the dark on the railroad near the factory, and he believes his assailant was a negro.
