American Pine Fibre Company.

A company under the above name was organized and incorporated in this city yesterday for the manufacture of bagging, etc., and the general development of what may be called the pine fibre industry. The company has an authorized capital of one million dollars, and its officers are:

President—Wm. Latimer.
Vice President—A. E. Thornton.
Secretary and Treasurer—G. H. Smith.

Directors—A. E. Thornton, Atlanta, Ga.; M. Frank, Columbus, Miss.; Wm. Latimer, Wm. Gilchrist, G. H. Smith, Wilmington.

The company has purchased all the patent rights and the plant for making fibre, etc., owned by the Acme Manufacturing Company and in operation at Cronly—separate from the fertilizer business carried on at the same place—and will largely extend the operation of these works. The present capacity of the mills for the manufacture of pine fibre bagging is 500,000 yards, but new machinery that will at once be added will more than double this capacity, and enable them to turn out annually at least 1,250,000 yards of bagging.
