Defined Duties.
The duties of the Board of Public Charities, the members of which were appointed last Saturday by Governor Fowle are thus defined by section 2271, chapter 2, volume 2 of the Code:

"The Board of Public Charities and the members of the General Assembly shall be *ex officio* visitors of all insane asylums. It shall be the duty of the Board of Public Charities to visit the asylums from time to time, as they may deem expedient, to examine into their condition and make report thereon to the General Assembly, with such suggestions and remarks as they may think proper. And to said Board, and to the Board of Directors of his Asylum, and to the General Assembly only, shall each Superintendent be required to make reports or furnish statistics.

A Ducking for the Ducks.
Mr. James Bowden, of Summer's Rest, was out sailing yesterday at Wrightsville with four young ladies, two daughters of Capt. Manning and two others, daughter and niece of Capt. Tribou, of the Clyde line. When in the Banks Channel a flaw of wind struck the boat and she capsized in ten feet of water. They were on the bottom of the boat and clinging to it by one hand while by the other each held and supported one of the other young ladies, before Mr. Bowden could reach them. Capt. John H. Daniel, Mr. Martin Daniels and Messrs. Raymond Nolan and Samuel Bauersfeld went to their assistance in the yacht *Vixen* and rescued them from their uncomfortable position.

Centennial Catalogue of the University of North Carolina.
This is considerably more than an ordinary catalogue. In addition to the lists of names of officers and students, 1789-1889, it contains an interesting and valuable historical sketch, covering 63 pages, by President Battle, with 11 full page plates. The catalogue proper gives, very concisely, the leading facts in the life of each student, graduate and non-graduate, as far as these facts could be ascertained by the compiler, Mrs. C. P. Spencer, who has done her work with skill.

It is an array of famous names such as few institutions in the United States can produce, names of men who have bought fame to North Carolina and the whole country, as well as to their *alma mater* at Chapel Hill.

The catalogue is a good sized book of 250 pages, and is by far the handsomest publication of the kind that we have seen.

Duplin Roads.
We understand that a petition is being gotten up for presentation to Capt. John F. Divine, Superintendent of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, asking for the construction of a new and larger warehouse at Wallace, generally known as Duplin Roads. A correspondent at that place writes us to this effect and he says that about one hundred of the best citizens of the town and surrounding country have signed the petition. He says: "There is not a village on the line of the W. & W. R. R. where the society is better than at Duplin Roads, and a more kind hearted, generous, charitable people does not exist anywhere. It is a thriving village, 36 miles from Wilmington, and a large amount of business is done here. The present warehouse is too small for the business and we believe that Capt. Divine will heed our request. We receive and ship more freight than any station South of Mt. Olive, on this road. We hope the day is not far distant when we will have here a handsome, commodious, brick warehouse.

Confederate Veterans.
The adjourned meeting of Confederate Veterans of New Hanover county, held last night at the Court House, was well attended.

Col. E. D. Hall called the meeting to order. Col. DeRosset, from the committee on organization, reported a form of constitution for the "Confederate Veterans Association of New Hanover County," which after some amendments, was adopted.

A motion was adopted that the constitution may be amended or repealed by a two third vote of those present at any regular meeting.

An amendment that no fees or dues shall be paid by any disabled member was adopted, but on motion of Mr. Heinsberger was reconsidered, when it was moved and adopted that any member may be exempted from payment of dues or fees by the executive committee.

The officers are to be elected annually at the regular meeting in April, and shall consist of a commander, first and second vice commanders, a secretary and treasurer, and assistant secretary and treasurer.

An election for offices was held, which resulted as follows:

Commander—Col. J. D. Taylor.
First Vice Commander—Maj. T. D. Love.
Second Vice Commander—Wm. H. Green.
Secretary and Treasurer—Wm. Blanks.
Assistant Secretary and Treasurer—S. G. Hall.

Executive Committee—Col. E. D. Hall, G. W. Huggins, P. Heinsberger, Col. W. L. DeRosset.

On motion, it was resolved that twenty members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The meeting adjourned subject to the call of the Commander.

The constitution states the purpose of the organization; that it shall be composed of paroled, honorably resigned or discharged officers and enlisted men of the army or navy of the Confederate States, and each applicant for membership shall furnish satisfactory proof of honorable service and discharge. The annual dues are \$1.00, payable quarterly or annually in advance. Regular meetings will be held in April and October of each year, and the annual reunion shall be held during the encampment of the State Guard, as designated by the commander.

A resolution was adopted intrusting the secretary to forward to the Secretary of the State Association the plan of organization and the names of the officers elected, signifying willingness to cooperate with the State organization in all matters pertaining to the welfare or benefit of the veterans of North Carolina.
