The duties of the Board of Public Charities, the members of which were appointed last Saturday by Governor Fowle are thus defined by section 2271, chapter 2, volume 2 of

"The Board of Public Charities Assembly shall be ex officio visitors of all insane asylums. It shall be the duty of the Board of Public Charities to visit the asylums from time to time, as they may deem expedient, to examine into their condition and make report thereon to the General Assembly, with such suggestions and remarks as they may think proper. And to said Board, and to the Board of Direc tors of his Asylum, and to the General Assembly only, shall each Superintendent be required to make reports or furnish statistics.
