In London 130,000 laborers are on strike.

Of the 16,000 postmasters appointed since March 4, over one half are Union soldiers.

The present strength of the Grand Army of the Republic is 415,228, an increase of 59,000 during the past year.

There was an earthquake on the Russian frontier on Tuesday and in one village 129 persons were buried alive.

Since 1861 one thousand millions have been paid out for pensions in this country. It seems about time to call a halt somewhere.

Alexander Cunningham, who died at Jacksonville, Ill., a few days ago, is said to have been for some years a coachman to Sir Walter Scott.

Mahone is said to have raised \$60,000 by mortgaging some real estate he owns in Washington City and will spend the money on the campaign.

It is a fact that Grover Cleveland approved a larger number of special pension acts than were approved by any two of his predecessors since the war—and the predecessors were all Republicans.

A very disgraceful controversy is going on between Dr. Hammond and Dr. Lewis A. Sayre. Some pretty talk is being used on both sides and we do not think that either will emerge spotless from the fight.

Mahone must be a bitter pill for some of the decent Northern Republicans to swallow. He was a Confederate brigadier and he is now a repudiator. Politics make strange bed-fellows, though.

The Gentiles of Salt Lake City are elated over the result of the recent city election. They not only elected their Legislative candidates in several precincts, but in the city at large secured a majority over the Mormons, insuring them, as they believe, a Gentile city government in February next.

We regret to learn that Mr. William M. Lewis, of New York, who has been in the city for several days on a visit to relatives here, and who is the guest of his brother, Mr. Geo. G. Lewis, is quite sick and confined to the bed. We hope, however, to hear that he is out again in a few days.

Mr. Gladstone has written to express his sympathy with Sarah Bernhardt upon the death of Damala. Private letters received in London state that she feels his death most acutely, having grown passionately fond of him after their quarrel and his flight to Tunis, where he masqueraded as a soldier of France.

Tanner plainly says that he means to empty the public treasury and to pour it out in a golden shower on the heads of the G. A. R. He says that is what they fought for. If it is, then in God's name let them have it all, every dollar, but tear down some of those flaunting lies about love of country, native land, etc.
