**STATE NEWS.**

**Clinton Caucasian:** Mr. Clifton Ward has received his commission as Postmaster at this place and will take charge next Monday. The revival at the Baptist Church, under the management of Rev. O. P. Meeks, the pastor, continues this week. So far there has been fifteen or sixteen conversions and seven additions to the church.

**Newbern Journal:** Mr. Moulton, the taxidermist, brought to our office yesterday a curiosity in the shape of a tusk, or something resembling the tusk of an elephant. On a card attached were these words: "This tusk was taken by Richard Midyette while fishing a drag net at New Inlet, Paulico Sound, N. C." Our zoologist gives it up. It looks like ivory, 2 feet 5 inches in length, 2 1/2 inches in diameter at the larger end, and with a slight curve tapers gracefully to a point. It weighs nearly 4 1/2 pounds.

**Charlotte Chronicle:** The Renwood Cotton Mill, a new brick building about a mile from Lowell, owned by Capt. Harrison Watts and D. R. Smith, burned down yesterday morning. The mill had been shut down for a week. The picker house alone was saved by the gangway being cut away. Much valuable machinery is lost, a large portion of which has but recently been moved into the mill. The mill had 6,000 spindles. The total loss is \$65,000. The mill was insured for \$51,000. Capt. Watts says that he has no idea whatever, how the fire originated.

**Lenoir Topic:** On the 22nd of August the residence and out buildings of Mr. Alva Barlow and of his mother, Mrs. Cynthia Barlow, on King's Creek, were destroyed by fire. Loss about \$1,000. They have rebuilt on the same site. Messrs. J. M. Bernhardt, of Lenoir, and A. G. Brenner, of Charlotte, have purchased, for \$4,000, the Green Hill property at Blowing Rock from Mr. D. W. Estes. This farm of 200 acres is right at the turnpike gap and is one of the finest properties at Blowing Rock. On it are the famous Green Hill and the Yadkin Spring. The view from Green Hill is unsurpassed on the mountain.

**Charlotte News:** The Charlotte factories are still booming along and there is increasing prosperity at each of the four mills. The directors of the Victor Mills yesterday instructed its president to buy 1,500 additional spindles and the extra machinery will be ordered at once. This will give the Victor a total of 12,000 spindles. Two months ago George Anderson and another colored man got into a fight at Beaver Dam, Union county, and in the fight Anderson was bitten on his thumb. No attention was paid to the wound at the time, but a week or two afterwards inflammation set in and Anderson soon became helpless. He was sent to the county poor house at Monroe, and on Monday last it became necessary to amputate his arm as a last resort. Even now it is feared that the negro's life cannot be saved, as he is in a critical condition.

**Roxboro special to Charlotte Chronicle:** A shocking surprise awaited one of the families of J. S. W. Long, living near Roxboro, on going, yesterday morning, the 6th instant, to the barn on the premises. Miss Sallie Moore, a young teacher boarding at Mr. Long's, was found cold in death, suspended by a plow line tied around her neck, to a joint of the barn, about twenty five feet above the ground. It appeared that there had been only a momentary struggle after the fatal leap. Her dress was found pinned in an unusual way around her neck. On opening the dress thus arranged, two gashes were found on her neck, from which it was evident that she attempted suicide with a razor. It is thought that she made this attempt in a room of the dwelling early in the morning, and that, her courage failing, she made her way to the barn where she ended her life in the manner stated. She left a note in which were written: "He does not care to save my life," and words of farewell to her father and mother.
