Church in Goldsboro.

Competitive Examination.
The Board of Education will meet in the Commissioners' Room on Monday next, the 23d inst., at 11 o'clock, with Capt. E. W. Manning, Superintendent of Public Instruction, for the purpose of examining applicants for admission to the North Carolina College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. Each applicant must be at least 14 years old. Under the law each county is entitled to as many free pupils as she has representatives in the lower legislative house and New Hanover is awarded two. The successful competitors will therefore be entitled to free tuition for the scholastic year. The other expenses will be about \$100 each.

Reunion of Confederate Veterans.
[Reported for the Daily Review.]

As was announced in the columns of the REVIEW, the Soldiers' Reunion and Picnic took place at Kenansville on Saturday last. There was a large crowd in attendance. The meeting was called to order by the Vice President of the Society, Mr. W. A. Moore, of Magnolia. Col. T. S. Kenan, of Raleigh, was present and was the first speaker to address the meeting. Col. Kenan needed no introduction to the people of Duplin, for in 1861, when the first gun was fired at Fort Sumter, Col. Kenan, then a mere boy from college, raised a company in this county. This company was called the Duplin Rifles, and a braver company of boys never entered the Confederate service. After Col. Kenan had finished his speech, then came Mr. A. D. Ward, who spoke only a few moments, but it was one of the finest addresses I have ever had the pleasure of listening to. At the conclusion of Mr. Ward's speech it was announced that dinner would be ready in half an hour. During that time, to see the old soldiers going around shaking hands, one with another, was a scene that did me good. Some of them had not met since the flag of the Confederacy trailed in the dust at Appomattox Court House in Virginia. I saw one old soldier from Lenoir county come up and shake hands with an old comrade of his and say: "Bob, old fellow, this is the first time I have seen you since we were climbing the heights of Gettysburg together."

Long will be remembered the 14th day of September, the day of the reunion, and should they all ever meet on this earth again to hold a reunion, I hope they may all meet in that world above, where they may hold reunions that never end. At 2 o'clock dinner was announced and all marched in and all had a plenty of the choicest viands the earth affords.

After dinner the Veterans met in the Court House where they organized a Duplin County Soldiers' Reunion, to be held every year on the Thursday after the second Sunday in October. They elected as officers of the society, Wm. A. Moore, of Magnolia, President, and S. B. Newton, of Kenansville, Secretary. It is requested that all the old soldiers collect all the historical sketches of the late war they can and bring them along with them at the next meeting of the reunion, as well as their wives and children. Then there was a committee of one from each township in the county appointed as follows:

This ended one of the most harmonious meetings I ever witnessed. Not an intoxicated man was seen on the ground. Love, harmony and good will seemed to prevail during the entire day.

The Theatrical Season.
Miss Agnes Herndon, with an excellent company, will open the theatrical season in this city to-morrow night and the box sheet is now open at Mr. Yates' book store. She will play in *La Belle Marie*. The *New York Times* compliments Miss Herndon very highly. It says:

Miss Agnes Herndon, a handsome woman and an actress of great popularity, appeared at the Windsor Theatre last night in a piece, classed on the bill as a "comedy drama," called "*La Belle Marie*, or a Woman's Revengé." There was a very large attendance and no lack of applause, so the season at the Windsor Theatre may be said to have been opened auspiciously. Miss Herndon wore a number of handsome dresses, and her acting was marked by a degree of emphasis which seemed to exactly touch the appreciation of the audience. "*La Belle Marie*" involves a trite and, at the same time, probable story, and its scene changes from Fall River, Mass., to New York and its vicinity. The interior of a tramps' lodging house is one of the stage pictures, and much hilarity was caused by the exhibition, therein presented, of an inmate's encounter with a cake of soap. The humor of the play is persuasive and emphatic.

Too Late for the Rebate.
A telegram from Washington City, bearing the date of last Friday, the 13th inst., says that the Treasury Department has received a letter from the Collector of Customs at this port transmitting the joint petition of Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son and Williams & Murchison, cotton, exporters, for payment of drawback on certain bagging reported during the period beginning October 1, 1884, and ending December 31, 1884.

It appears, says the dispatch, that while the applicants made no entry and took no steps towards the collection of drawbacks on these exportations of bagging (of which they were actual shippers and the last owners before it left this country), yet they base their claim upon the fact that the United States Bagging Manufacturing Association, an association which, according to their own statement, had no interest in the drawback, has presumed to make entries for drawback on these exportations. The applicants having taken no steps at the time of exportation to protect their rights in the premises, the Department sees no ground for any allowance at this late date.

Weather Crop Bulletin.
The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Crop Bulletin, published by the North Carolina Experiment Station and State Weather Service, show that the rainfall has been below the average over the greater portion of the State, while the temperature has been about normal and sunshine somewhat above the average for the week ending September 13th. Unfavorable reports come from the north-eastern counties, in which portion of the State the weather has been cool and misty, with high north-west winds having an injurious effect on cotton and other crops. In all other portions of the State the effect of the weather has been beneficial to all crops, especially cotton, which is opening nicely. Picking has commenced, and in two weeks will become general with every prospect for an average, though somewhat late yield. The cotton worm has so far not caused much damage. Large areas of oats have been sowed and ground is being prepared for winter wheat. Plenty of sunshine and occasional showers have benefited all late crops. Farmers are very busy and confident.
