"Streets of New York."

Some Exodus Talk.

From Geo. W. Price, Jr., Chairman of the Commission who recently visited the Southwest to spy out the lands there in the interest of the proposed colored emigrants, we have received a copy of the report submitted by them. Of course it is all highly colored, beautifully rose tinted. This report will be received by many with something of distrust. The belief is getting abroad that there is "a nigger in the woodpile" somewhere and "considerable curiosity is being manifested to know who gets the money and how much is the rate per capita.

Stewart Ellison, of Raleigh, is one of the most prominent colored men in the State. Every man of his race in North Carolina knows him, or knows of him. He represented Wake county in the Legislature on several occasions and stands well with the Raleigh people, both white and colored. Well, Ellison told a New York *Herold* reporter last week that he took no stock in this thing; that he believed it was a scheme for some railroad men to make money; that the Mississippi Delta was not the place for the colored man to migrate to and that some of those who had already gone out there from North Carolina were anxious to get back. Laborers are paid there but 75 cents a day and supplies are all much higher there than in North Carolina. We think a reaction will soon set in and that the exodus fever will die a natural death before the year is dead.
