### A Robust Old Confed.

Mr. J. T. Collins, of Burgaw, writes us of the pleasure he had a few days since in meeting with Mr. Elijah Walker, from the upper part of Moore's Creek, in Pender County. Mr. Walker is a remarkable man in more ways than one. He enlisted in the late war in Capt. C. D. Ellis' company (B. 1st N. C. Battalion) in 1862 and served until the close. He was wounded in both hands, our correspondent does not say in which fight, but it was probably at Bentonsville, where this company was in the hardest of the fight. Mr. Walker is 98 years of age but is still hale, hearty and vigorous. He can easily walk 25 miles a day. He was never seriously sick and was never prescribed for by a physician. He can and sometimes does, follow a plow all day long. He is a wonderfully fine specimen of a very old man.

Miss Effie Ellsler, the brilliant young American actress, will appear at the Opera House in this city on Thursday night in "The Governess," a charming domestic drama. Her appearance here will be one of the notable theatrical events of the season. A gentleman in this city, an old theatre-goer and an accomplished dramatic critic, who is well acquainted with Miss Ellsler's wonderful dramatic career, writes us as follows in regard to her and her father:

Thursday night being the first appearance of the Ellslers in Wilmington, there may exist some doubt in the minds of our theatre patrons concerning their position in the profession. John Ellsler, as actor, author tutor and manager, has done as much for the American stage as any living man. A large number of the famed actors and actresses of to-day owe what they are to the kindly consideration, encouragement and training received at his hands. The old Academy of Music at Cleveland, Ohio, was the refuge and home of many struggling young men and women who are to-day "bright stars." Clara Morris owes her fame to Effie Ellsler's father, and the same fatherly care has made his daughter what she is to-day, a splendid actress, as was her mother before her. I have repeatedly seen the entire Ellsler family, father, mother and five children, including the "baby," on the stage at one time as the support of Jefferson, Adams, Owens, and Colquhoun. The modest, unassuming little lady of fourteen summers, dressed in calico frock and white opera trudging along to school, bookbag in hand, was the same who repeatedly delighted critical Cleveland audiences with her rendition of *Fanchon*. She was loved by her schoolfellows and they were proud of knowing her. They called her "Little Effie." Since then she has grown and played everything, from light comedy to heavy tragedy, with all the celebrities of the land. For her *Hazel Kirke* was written and for two long years, night after night, she played the part to crowded houses at the Madison Square Theatre in New York City. By honoring this father and daughter Thursday night, I am sure the patrons of the drama in Wilmington will do honor to themselves.

### Weather Crop Bulletin

The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Crop Bulletin, published by the North Carolina Experiment Station and State Weather Service, show that during the week ending Friday, September 27th, the rainfall has been somewhat above the average, except in the central and southeastern portion of the State, where it was about the average. The temperature and sunshine have been about the average for this season of the year. The weather has been generally favorable to crops and farm work of all kinds. The excess of rainfall occurred chiefly in the western portion of the State. General rains occurred during the night of the 25th and morning of the 26th. The fall was about 1.65 inches above the average, but no serious damage resulted. Light hoar frost formed Sunday morning, injuring tender vines and plants. Through the remainder of the week, though the nights were cool, the temperature was about an average. Plenty of sunshine has been favorable to the maturing of cotton—which is, however, opening but slowly. With a late fall it is expected that fully an average crop will be obtained in most districts.
